

SUPREME COURT MEETS.

Washington, Oct. 9.—The United States supreme court began its October term today, all the justices being on the bench. Among the distinguished people present was the attorney general of Great Britain, Sir Richard Webster. Chief Justice Fuller announced that owing to the death of Justice Blatchford all business set for today would go over until tomorrow, and the court adjourned to enable the members to pay their respects to the president of the United States in a body.

MURDERED ON THE STEPS.

San Francisco, Oct. 9.—In Felix Adler's free kindergarten shortly after 8 o'clock this morning Mrs. Sarah Collins was horribly gashed with a knife and an hour later expired. Mrs. Collins was janitress of the building. When the teachers arrived this morning the unfortunate woman was found lying on the school steps. Near by was a knife with which the tragedy was committed. Her husband, Patrick Collins, was arrested tonight.

KILLED BY A BILLIARD CUE.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 9.—What will be a fatal affray occurred in a saloon at Hamilton today. George B. Addington, owner of a shingle mill, quarreled with Swan Peterson while playing billiards and struck him over the head with a cue. Peterson will die. Addington is a southerner of good education, 41 years old and very popular about Edmond and Mount Vernon, where he lived several years. He was arrested and will be taken to Mount Vernon jail.

GAVE HIMSELF UP.

Seattle, Oct. 9. Colin E. Daughdrill, the young railroad man who killed Armstrong J. Stewart, yard master of the East Tennessee, Virginia and Georgia railroad at Gadsden, Ala., in March, 1892, gave himself up to Sheriff Moolery on Saturday afternoon, having been a fugitive two and a half years. He claims that he shot Stewart in self-defense, and that he now wants to go back to stand trial.

A CYCLONE AT INDEPENDENCE.

Independence, Or., Oct. 9.—The continued rains have caused the Willamette river to rise rapidly since last Friday, and it is now fifteen feet above low water mark. Today about noon during a reprieve of the sun, this town and Monmouth were visited by a small cyclone. Its base was apparently about fifteen feet wide. It unroofed woodsheds, overturned outhouses, tore up young trees and tore down fences.

PROBABLY A WHOLESALE STRIKE.

Providence, R. I., Oct. 9.—Six thousand employees of the woolen mills at Olneyville, a suburb of this city, inaugurated a strike this morning. The indications are that it will extend to all the woolen manufacturing establishments in this state, and there is talk of the cotton workers joining the strike. The strike is against a reduction of wages posted this morning.

ALL DROWNED.

Deer Park, Mich., Oct. 9.—A wrecked fishing boat has been picked up by the Muskogee life saving crew. It was found to be a boat which left White Fish Point on October 6th with eight persons on board including Captain W. H. Carter, his wife, one child and five men. It is thought that all were drowned.

DAMAGES \$2,000.

Albany, Or., Oct. 9.—A dwelling occupied by E. E. Parish and owned by D. B. Monteith caught fire this evening. The house was about half consumed. The loss is about \$2,000. The contents were insured in the Farmers' and Merchants' Insurance Co. for \$1500.

A BIG CATCH.

Victoria, B. C., Oct. 9.—The sealer Walter L. Rich has arrived from Behring Sea with over eighteen hundred seal skins. The Rich is the last of the Victoria fleet except the W. P. Hall, who, it is reported, has gone to Yokohama to refit.

WILL NOT CALL A SESSION.

Tacoma, Oct. 9.—Governor McGraw today authoritatively denied that he had said anything about calling an extra session of the legislature to elect a successor to ex-Senator John B. Allen, as has been reported.

A SLIGHT U. P. ACCIDENT.

Portland, Or., Oct. 9.—A Union Pacific freight train ran into a land slide near Hood River this morning. Fireman Wilson, Engineer Christian, and Conductor Glendinning, were slightly injured.

GAVE HIMSELF UP.

Portland, Oct. 9.—J. P. Atwood, who is accused of the embezzlement of \$3,000 while in the employ of Jacob Kamm, has returned from Europe and has voluntarily given himself into custody.

DE LESSEPS IS DYING.

Paris, Oct. 9.—Count Ferdinand de Lesseps is near death. The end of the great engineer may be expected at any moment.
