The Portland Asphaltum Co. has contracted with H. B. Parker to cover the Central Hotel with a four-ply asphalt and gravel roof, which will be the first of the character in Astoria. Mr. Sweeney, one of the contractors, has done a great deal of similar work in other coast cities, among the buildings being the Great Northern railroad shops in Spokane. These have an area of 194,670 square feet, and required 125,000 pounds of roofing pitch and 1,100 rolls of roofing paper, of 500 square feet each, before the work was complete. The contract was the most important one yet entered into by the company, and will serve to give an idea of the popularity of this class of roofing. The Portland City Hall, which is to cost \$500,000, will also be roofed by the Portland Asphaltum Company, as soon as the building is ready. In the metropolis the new material is fast growing in favor, and its benefits are becoming generally recognized.
