Udo Nordstrom the eight-year-old lad who was accidentally shot in the abdomen by his elder brother last week when on the way home from school, is dead. The little fellow was constantly attended by Dr. Tuttle, but no medical skill could save him. He succumbed yesterday morning, after having suffered several days of very great agony.

Yesterday the ship Poseidon, Captain Kainforth, arrived in 62 days from Newcastle, Australia, making one of the quickest trips on record from that port. She is of 1708 tons register, and carries 26 hands. Her cargo consists of 2548 tons of coal. About 1900 tons of her cargo will be discharged here before she proceeds to Portland. She experienced a heavy stress of weather last Wednesday, and got a big list to port, besides having a good deal of minor damage done to her forecastle head.

The ship Yarana, 52 days out from San Diego, was brought into port yesterday morning. This is the vessel concerning the safety of which grave fears have been expressed. The reason for her long passage—one of the longest on record, is that she is very light in ballast and like a balloon in the water. She should be drawing not less than 18 feet of water and barely registers 12 feet. Her captain reports that he had very little control over her, and that she first sighted the mouth of the river two weeks ago. She was blown away to the north and could not possibly make her way back any sooner. Pilot Grassman, who brought her in, has been aboard for four days. She has a crew of twenty-seven men, all well.

She is under charter to Turner, Beeton & Co., to load salmon for Liverpool or London. The British bark Harold, 1376 tons, Captain Kink, has been chartered by Robert Ward & Co., for salmon from Victoria to London or Liverpool. November-December loading. The Harold will almost clean up this season's pack. When all of the fleet have secured their cargoes there will be only a few odd lots remaining, only sufficient for the needs of the local trade. The Sirene, loading for London, is expected to finish this week and the Grandholm will be loaded in the early part of next week, for Liverpool.

The boat has been splendidly fitted up and the late additions to her engine room will make her as fleet footed as any steamer on the river. The A. F. C., with a very large number of their friends, will leave here on the Frankfort at 9 o'clock on Friday night, and will arrive in Portland by daylight on Saturday. Sharp at 3 o'clock on Saturday afternoon the first eleven of the local club will meet the Portlands on the Multnomah Athletic Club's grounds at the back of the Exposition building.
