The front beacon stands in 13 feet of low water, and the rear beacon in 6 feet, and 18 feet of water can be carried in the channel about 60 feet south of the beacon."

The Eugene Lumber Company was quite a heavy loser by the high water. There were about 300 logs in the boom when the rise came, and they endeavored to fasten them so they could not get awa, but before getting them secured a drift of logs came down the river and striking the boom caused it to break, and about 550 of the logs got away and floated down the river. About a dozen of them passed Harrisburg and some were caught there, but the balance have lodged along the banks below town and can be secured, but it will entail considerable expense to bring them back to the mill. The logs lost will scale about 270,000 feet of lumber. A lot of logs being floated down the river to be made into hoop poles also got away and went down with the current.

They allege that the sheriff has been allowed warrants to the amount of \$11,555.28 since November 1, 1892, and that they are fraudulent and made with the intent of cheating and defrauding the county, and were made in collusion with Judge Fisk and county commissioner Parker. The complaint asks that the county treasurer, Frank Reiser, be restrained by an order of the court from paying the said warrants." The Astorian understands that Mr. Noland, who is a brother of George Noland, of this city, intends to have the fullest investigation. That he is innocent of the charges, nobody in this city who knows him will question for a moment. He has done Lane county good service, and in the opinion of the Astorian, has been the best sheriff that district ever had. Mr. Noland will shame his detractors before he gets through with them.

The Herald of Trade says: "Heavy receipts of Alaska have been a feature of the week. The market has been quiet the past week with an absence of calls for large lots for domestic trade. The heavy purchases heretofore made are meeting present requirements. The feature of the week has been an exceptionally heavy export demand. From confidential sources we learn that there have been liberal sales at \$1 of red Alaska for shipment. What is known as the King salmon of Alaska is hard to tell from Columbia—even the best experts can be deceived (?) and therefore the low prices compared with Columbia river make them attractive to infirm dealers. The market is cleared up from first hands, of every case of spring and fall salmon packed in this state, Oregon and Washington. Of the Alaska pack, all canneries outside off the Alaska Packers' Association have cleaned up, while the association is about sold up. Dealers look for better prices before long."

Last Saturday evening the Finnish Evangelical Lutheran church was dedicated by Rev. Robert Hernberg, the Seaman's pastor in San Francisco. The house was packed with people. This church stands in the same lot where the old one was blown down a year ago. On Sunday evening the pastor, Rev. J. J. Hokka, who has returned to Astoria after an absence of eight years, was installed. The Swedish Evangelical Lutheran church was dedicated Sunday afternoon, by Rev. G. A. Anderson, of Spokane, Wash., assisted by five other pastors. This is a very neat little church. It has cost over \$200 to erect, and the lot was bought for \$1500, but is worth \$2,000. The pioneer of the Lutheran church on the Pacific coast, Rev. P. Carlsson, has led the congregation in this work. Yesterday the members of this church had a business meeting for the purpose of calling a permanent pastor. Mr. J. A. Edlund, a theological student of the seminary of Rock Island, Ill., who will be ordained next summer, was unanimously called.
