The following item of news of interest to the Astoria police, comes from San Francisco: Warrants were issued yesterday for the arrest of Go Ah Ning, Hong Ah Now and Lee Din on a charge of murder the complaining witness being Yee Ah Sing, a merchant of 705 Jackson street. The murder with which the men are charged was committed on the night of July 5, 1885. A Chinese by the name of Gee Pong was shot dead in the hallway of the house at 35 Waverly place. Another celestial named See Leong told the police that he was an eyewitness to the murder, and that the murderer was a highbinder named Lee Din. Lee Din was a member of the Suey On Tong, a notorious highbinder organization. He was not apprehended and the authorities believe he has skipped to Astoria or one of the northern coast ports.

The wet weather has damaged quite a lot of wheat in this country, says the Ashland Tidings. Wheat was being received at the mill in this city at a lively rate until the late rains commenced, and there has been quite a falling off since then. About 35,000 bushels have been received at the mill for storage, and there are a great many sacks out yet but it is not known how much more wheat will be brought in, though quite a large amount is expected. Some of the wheat brought in of late shows the effects of the wet weather. We were shown some which had been of very fine quality, but had been stacked and becoming wet, some of the kernels had sprouted, which, of course, spoils it for first-class wheat. The yield in the county is about an average. There has been a weakening in the wheat market in the last few days, and forty-eight cents was quoted as the price Monday.

That paper says:—"Sheriff Noland will meet the matter in the courts fearlessly. The charge that Judge Fisk and County Commissioner Parker are in collusion to defraud the county will not be entertained a moment by any one acquainted with these gentlemen, and we believe it a damnable one and unwarranted and unjust in the extreme. To show to what extremes the committee go in their charges against Sheriff Noland, the complaint alleges that he has not performed any services whatever since Nov. 2, 1892, but what are of a fraudulent nature. In a nutshell, the whole cause of complaint arises from the fact that Mr. Noland has compelled the payment of delinquent taxes and charged for it."

The Valley Record says of the recent disturbances in that region: "The worst feature of the attack upon the Chinamen is the fact, pretty well understood, that the hoboes were plotted and led by certain individuals residing in our own community, who consider the Chinese direct business rivals, and are willing to incite to robbery, and possibly contingent arson and murder, in order to close them out. Professional anti-Chinese agitators and other persons who combine and force the Chinese from communities by peaceful means strike a certain sympathy among almost all classes of citizens, but what shall be said of young men who would lead such a mob of hoboes to attack the Chinese, for robbery, and then themselves sink out of the melee to escape the law. The law is said to have tumbled over some of the Ashland toughs, as it was, but witnesses who remain here are discreetly silent, and those of the hoboes who could tell a damaging story were hustled off out of town with the money they stole from the Chinese in their pockets." This has a local application—or rather it might have had, if a few dynamite drunks had been allowed to have their way.
