The Oregonian contains the following item. The news in it is interesting; the comments are thrown in for what they are worth: "A gentleman who is interested in having a railroad built to Astoria, states that Mr. Stanton, who was here last spring in the interest of Eastern capitalists, endeavoring to promote the road from Goble to Astoria, will arrive here today on the same errand. It is said he comes prepared to build the road if the Astoria people accede to his demands. If this is so, it is to be hoped that his demands will be reasonable, and that the Astoria people will comply with them and secure the thing they have so long been striving for. It has always been said that if Astoria secures one road she will secure two. The Goble road is not the one favored by a majority of the Astorians, but they will be willing to do all in their power to have it built if it is to aid in bringing about the construction of the road through the Nehalem, which is the one most desired, and which will open up a fine section of country."

The report of Brigadier General William P. Carlin, commanding the military department of the Columbia, which includes the states of Oregon, Washington and a part of Idaho, and the territory of Alaska, has been received at the war department. The general devotes a large part of his report to urging the necessity for the abandonment of some small posts in the department, because of their inaccessibility, and the establishment of larger posts in place of them at points near the railroad and the large cities and towns. General Carlin recommends the discontinuance of Fort Spokane, Wash., and the construction of a post near Spokane. Fort Townsend, he says, is useless to protect the cities and harbors of Puget Sound, and he thinks the garrison should be removed to some important point. One, if not two, points in addition to these named could, in General Carlin's opinion, be abandoned with advantage to the government. Fort Canby, at the mouth of the Columbia river, would be of great importance in time of war with a naval power, but it is inaccessible in winter, and only a small garrison is required there in time of peace. Fort Stevens, on the opposite or Southern side of the river, is also a point of

great importance and General Carlin urges that it be strongly fortified. General Carlin reports that desertions in the department of the Columbia showed an increase during the year. He says that the attempt to enlist a company of Indians resulted in failure.

At noon in the family residence were Frank J. Taylor, Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Taylor, Mr. and Mrs. George Taylor, Mrs. White, the Misses White, and Miss Mary Taylor, the mourners, besides many close friends of the family. Rev. Dr. Garner conducted the services. As soon as they were concluded, the cortege set out for Fisher's dock, and on arrival there the party was transferred to the steamer Dwyer and Electric, taken to the railway bridge, and thence to Clatsop cemetery. There, in the family burial plot, very near the scenes of her early labors in Oregon, was laid to rest a wife and mother whose memory will live green and cherished in the hearts of everybody that knew her. Rev. R. B. Dilworth preached and officiated at the grave, and in a few, well chosen words dwelt on the character and attributes of the deceased. The benediction was pronounced by Rev. Mr. Sayre. The Pioneer and Historical Society was officially represented at the funeral. Messrs. G. Wingate, P. L. Cherry, V. Boelling, R. N. Carnahan, W. B. Adair and H. G. Van Dusen were the pall bearers. The hearse and coffin were covered with beautiful flowers, tributes from this county and many other parts of the state, from women who had known and loved Mrs. Taylor for nearly half a century. The Astorian extends its sincerest condolences to the bereaved family. Their consolation should be that their wife and mother made the world a little better by being in it. She has closed an honored life and has laid down the burden of a ripe old age, taking with her the affection and reverence of all.
