Nov. 2—A special despatch to the Associated Press reports that Lobingula king of the Matabeles will probably surrender in a few days as he is closely pressed by the British. On October 21 the Matabeles five thousand strong, made a furious attack on the British from several sides at once They showed admirable disciplins and the greatest bravery. The British re-

served their fire until the Matabeles were at close range, and then opened on them with Martini rifles and Maxim rapid fire guns. They finally broke and fled, leaving five hundred killed and wounded on the field, and carrying with them hundreds of other wounded, besides those able to stagger away into some retreat.
