McKINLEY AND OHIO. The campaign in Ohio is progressing as satisfactorily as any friend of protection to American industries could wish.

William McKinley, in his stumping tour of the state, is being received by such numbers and with such enthusiasm as few residents of the Buckeye state can remember in a state campaign.

He is giving the people such arguments as are absolutely unanswerable. His democratic opponent continues to harp upon the "robber tariff," but there are evidences that this old gag will not do any longer.

The people were fooled by it once, but with such object lessons as they now have before them, all over the country, it is almost an insult to their intelligence to ask them to again vote the democratic ticket.

Reasons why McKinley should be elected are to be found, not only in Ohio, but in the prevailing conditions in every state in the Union. But let us take one city in the Buckeye state—the city of Canton.

Within the four years from 1889 to 1893 Canton increased its population by 15,000, and it had nearly 100 manufacturing establishments. How great a change has been produced by the election of Cleveland may be seen in the fact that not half a dozen of these factories are now in operation.

THE REAL REASON. E. Nelson Blake, who acquired a fortune in Chicago, and who for five terms was president of the Chicago board of trade, has opinions as to the cause of the present depression of trade which coincide exactly with those heretofore expressed in these columns.

Men, he says, are not withdrawing money from banks now—they are making deposits. Money is plentiful, but not in circulation. Trade languishes, and why? From lack of confidence. Not from lack of confidence in the banks, for their reserves are ample, beyond the limits needed to inspire and assure confidence.

The real lack of confidence lies in the uncertain future of the home market of the United States. Mr. Blake says: It is the tariff question that is responsible for this year's disaster.

Manufacturers will not risk their capital in the production of stock that cannot be sold until six months have passed between the time of the first step in conversion from raw material to that of its being placed on the market, if they fear that when the six months are ended they will be compelled to sell in an unrestricted competition with the product of foreign manufacturers, whose wage cost has been less than half that of their own.

This is a proposition too plain to need the support of an argument. Time is dull because money does not circulate, and it does not circulate because of the future of the home market of the United States.

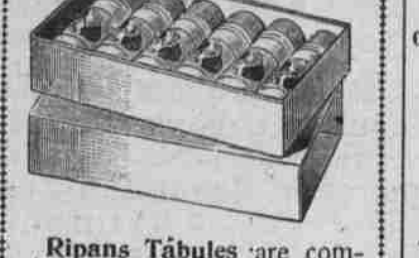
