The majority of the delegates to the republican convention on Saturday next got together yesterday and after some discussion decided to select a committee to wait on Mayor Crosby. The committee called on the mayor and told him that it was the general feeling of the delegates that he should receive the nomination for the next term of the mayoralty. Mr. Crosby at once expressed his pleasure that this was the case, and stated that he was, and always had been, a republican, and that he would feel glad and proud to accept the republican nomination if it were tendered to him. The committee then adjourned, and, at another meeting of delegates held later in the day, made their report. It was then immediately decided that the whole delegation should enter the convention on Saturday and re-nominate Mayor Crosby for the position he has so well and honorably filled. Speaking to the committee, after his acceptance of their proposal, he said that he had long desired to see the republican party united once more for the general good of the community.

James Anderson, keeper of the Fort Canby lighthouse, came up to town yesterday. He brought with him carefully wrapped up, a small piece of dirty stick and an insignificant branch of seaweed, but both the seaweed and the stick were thickly powdered with pure gold. The weed or "Irish Moss Blanc Mange," as all old settlers know it, grows between the kelp and the rocks in the vicinity of Fort Canby, and is a common article of food. After being bleached and mixed with boiling water it makes a blanc mange indistinguishable from the real corn starch. Mr. Anderson picked a quantity of it last spring, and bleached it throughout the summer in shallow wooden boxes. The other day when cutting the boxes up for kindling wood, he noticed that they contained a large number of scattered grains of gold, and on some of the pieces of seaweed he also found traces of the precious metal. Tracing the cause of this strange discovery to its source, it appears that in the spring when the swell around the lighthouse is not very strong, the black sand that abounds in that vicinity had been washed over the kelp continuously, leaving these gold deposits behind on the seaweed. Mr. Anderson says that he has found a gold mine, but under present conditions it is absolutely impossible to abstract the gold from the black sand as no reducing apparatus has yet been discovered that will do it. It has long been known that there is gold in all the sand on the Lower Columbia, but up to the present time, though trials have been repeatedly made, no known process is known enough to sever the metal from it.
