There were thirty-five young people present, and the greatest enthusiasm prevailed. After the adoption of a constitution and by-laws, the officers for the first quarterly term were elected as follows: President, L. O. Belland; vice-president, Peter Walde; secretary, Fred Olsen; treasurer, A. Halsb; marshal, S. Gimre. Three new members joined, and L. O. Belland recited an original poem written for the occasion and entitled "To the Society Minerva." Next Thursday night there will be a long program of recitations, songs, music, etc., and a debate on the subject, "Which is the strongest—Money or Love." For money—Peter Walde; for Love—Sofus Jensen.

It is of course impossible to state accurately what ticket the republican convention will nominate. It is certain, however, that Mayor Crosby will receive the unanimous nomination for re-election. George Nelson and Gust. Holmes are both spoken of for councilmen in the third ward. August Scherneckau and Theodore Bracker seem to be the popular candidates for the second ward. For the first ward, several names, all excellent, are mentioned. Among these the most prominent are Captain G. Reed, R. N. Carnahan, Andrew C. Reed, and John Hay. Charles Holt will without doubt be the selection for street superintendent. For treasurer, the name of Ben. L. Ward stands foremost, and there seems to be little question that he will secure the nomination. S. T. McKean and several others are talked of for the post of auditor, and J. O. Hanthorn will doubtless be the favorite among the delegates for the position of police commissioner. For the responsible office of city attorney, James A. Eakin is mentioned by several of the delegation, and it is very probable that he will be the choice of the party.

The little 12-ton sealing schooner Volunteer, Captain Wheeler, has arrived on the Sound after a perilous journey across the Pacific from the S'berian coast. For about ten months she has been riding all sorts of waves on the Pacific ocean, from the gentle swell to the mountains of sea thrown up by a 70-mile-an-hour hurricane. She reached Seattle, her home port, without boats, binnacle, compass, or anchors, and with a few tattered sails and a deck as bare as the floor of a dancing-hall. Everything was carried away in a tremendous hurricane, which struck the little craft the 11th of October, distant from Cape Flattery to the northwest about 800 miles. There was 20 minutes of the most extreme peril that Captain Wheeler and his crew of five men ever experienced, or probably that any seaman

ever passed through safely. The Volunteer was on her beam's end for that length of time, with her nose under water. Every moment of the time seemed an age to the seamen, for the boats were gone, and they thought that the next instant the Volunteer would go straight to Davy Jones' locker. It was a question of bringing the craft about going to the bottom of the sea. Fortune favored the man at the wheel, and she slowly came about and was righted in a manner. Before any more big seas reached her she was in decently fair shape and rose them out. One of the two boats on the deck was lying bottom up when the seas came aboard, and it was smashed as flat as a pancake and the splinters swept away. The other boat was also smashed and swept into the sea, as was the wheel house, compass, anchors and anchor chains and every thing else above decks. Everything below had been upset but was righted. Fortunately for the safety of all there was a small dory compass aboard, which seal hunters use when they go out in their boats, and with this the Volunteer was steered into Seattle after she had been put in as good shape as possible.

Yesterday afternoon several of the delegates of the "Citizens" party, all but three (Messrs. A. R. Cyrus, C. W. Shively, and R. M. Stuart) met in convention in the court room of the police judge and proceeded to business. Outside the members of the convention there were two or three people present. Councilman E. C. Lewis opened the meeting, called it to order, and asked for the election of a chairman and secretary of the proceedings.

On motion of Alex. Gilbert, Mr. Lewis was appointed chairman, and Mr. Jeff Crandell, secretary.

The chairman then appointed the following committee to examine credentials and report: Perry Trullinger, H. H. Anderson, and W. E. Joplin. They reported that all the credentials were correct, with four missing.

Perry Trullinger then moved that the chairman appoint a committee of 3 on platform, and a committee of 5 on order of business.

The chairman appointed Messrs. Stokes, Langworthy, and Salz a committee on platform, and Messrs. Keen, Olsen, Minard, Evenson, and Wright, on order of business.

Mr. Lewis followed up this appointment by stating that it was the usual custom in conventions to adjourn to a caucus for the purpose of making nominations, and he proposed that this should be done. All the delegates then filed into the caucus room and were closed there for considerably over an hour. During that time there was a good deal of banging of doors and hurrying into the street and back again, presumably for the purpose of attempting to get acceptances to the proposed nominations.

When the convention reached the court room Chairman Lewis read the report of the committee on order of business signed by "Chairman Keen," of the committee. On its adoption the committee on platform reported the watchword and platform of the party: "An economical and safe government for the people of Astoria." Mr. Lewis then gave the signal for the beginning of the performance that had been rehearsed in the caucus room, and the following ticket was nominated:

For mayor, Dr. Alfred Kinney; for councilman, First ward, Isaac Bergman; Second ward, Benj. L. Ward; Third ward, Benjamin Young; for auditor and police judge, C. Osburn; for city treasurer, J. W. Conn; for surveyor, Richard Harry; for street superintendent, Wm. Chadwick; for police commissioner, John Kopp; for harbor master, Capt. Geo. Bell.

The following city committee was appointed by Chairman Lewis: Messrs. E. C. Lewis, (chairman) L. Lebeck, F. Keen, C. Brown, H. Grube, Wright, Leland, and Minard.

Mr. B. L. Ward, of course, declines to accept the nomination for councilman, being a delegate to the republican convention, and a republican. He informed a committee of the "citizens" party some days ago that he was not willing to have his name brought forward, and was very much surprised last night to hear that his request had been ignored.

Mr. Keen, secretary of the "citizens" committee, expressed the firm conviction that every man on the ticket would be elected without a shadow of doubt. That naturally settles the whole business, without the necessity of an election.
