In an article on the Bering Sea con troversy the Courier-Journal in a recent issue says: "It was certainly as much the interest of Great Britain as of the United States to stop the ruth The two nations would readily have agreed to enforce regulations to prevent that destruction if that had been the only question. But, in fact, there would have been no pelagic sealing to the extent that appeared if the United States had not denied the right of the British to take seals at all in Bering Sea, and finally, to take seals anywhere in the ocean if they had ever been in our territory of land or sea. 
