The British ship Wendur, 1896 tons, Captain Dickinson, has been added to the list of shipping en route to this port.

Mrs. George Trenchard yesterday presented her husband with a boy weighing twelve pounds. Mother and child are doing well.

The steamship Geo. W. Elder, Capt. Pohlman, arrived down from Portland yesterday, but on account of the rough weather outside did not cross out.

The British ship Poseidon, Captain Klenforth, arrived down from Portland yesterday, loaded with wheat for the United Kingdom for orders. Her cargo consisted of 84,400 bushels, valued at \$56,000.

HIS REASON DETHRONED.

A. Davis of Cathlamet Writes a Threatening Letter.

Judge Langhorn has issued a warrant for the arrest of A. Davis, formerly connected with the Cathlamet Gazette, and when the papers are served, Davis will be taken before a commission of lunacy. It appears that about two weeks ago Davis wrote a letter to the following named gentlemen: O. M. Harvey, J. Bruce Polworth, George M. Cornwall (editor of the Gazette), Charles Warren, and A. D. Birnie, in which he made a rather peculiar demand. The letter was couched in terms about as follows, as near as an Astorian reporter was able to ascertain:

"Sirs: Revenge is sweet. You must atone for your crime. I demand \$3000, the money to be placed in my drawer in my room before midnight on November 11th. If you do not comply with my request I will burn your buildings and place each of you under the sod."

When the letter was read, the gentlemen became alarmed, and armed themselves, and put a watch on Warren's cannery, in order to be prepared for emergencies should incendiarism be attempted. Davis then locked himself in his room and could not be persuaded to emerge therefrom. The sheriff attempted to dislodge him, but without avail, and it was not until the expiration of forty-eight hours, during which he had neither food nor drink, that the evidently insane man reappeared. When he did come out, he at once took the boat for Portland and was seen there a few days ago by a resident of Westport. The residents of Cathlamet are much exercised over the threatening letter, and vow that same on insane, Davis will never again reside there.

WHO OWNS THE BRICKS? Wade Hampton Smith's Case Taken Under Advisement.

The case of Wade Hampton Smith, charged with assault with a deadly weapon, came up before Justice Cleveland yesterday, and was taken under advisement after hearing the testimony, which, together with an exchange of pleasantries between the legal brethren, was interesting. Fulton Bros. defended Mr. Smith, and A. R. Kanaga for the prosecution. The evidence showed that the facts of the case were substantially as published in these columns on Wednesday. It also appeared that after the bricks had been sold under the terms of the chattel mortgage, Mr. Smith had caused a fence to be erected on his property across the only means of access to the brick yard, and it was this obstruction that Christensen was in the act of removing when accosted by Mr. Smith. The evidence further showed that Sheriff Smith wrote two letters to Mr. Smith warning him not to interfere with the men, as they owned the bricks and had a right to remove them. Mr. Kanaga stated that his client would take the property if he had to do so by force of arms, to which Mr. Fulton responded that his client would hold on to the property and use a gun if necessary.
