The Ida Hazel returned from Portland yesterday. The Norwegian bark Ophelia arrived down from Portland yesterday. The British ship Wm. Mitchell will arrive down today from Portland. The steamer South Coast crossed out yesterday morning for San Francisco. The barge Ludlow was brought down the river yesterday in tow of the steamer Vulcan. The British ship Poseldon sailed yesterday for Falmouth for orders with a cargo of wheat. The steamer Cascades brought down three large loads of rock for the jetty on Monday night. Clerk Trenchard has completed the transcript in the case of the state of Oregon vs. John Hansen. Nick Davich's launch Elida was attached yesterday at the instance of Palmer & Rey, of Portland. The steamer Signal arrived down from Portland yesterday and crossed out, bound for Vancouver, B. C. The British bark Amuree, 1359 tons, is on the list of vessels bound for this port. She comes from San Pedro. Collector Page has appointed J. H. Bridgeford to the position of Deputy collector of customs at Tillamook. The ships Invercoe and Cambuskenneth will be down from Portland before the expiration of the present week. The Cuthona received 36s. 3d. per ton for taking wheat to the United Kingdom, of 1s. 3d. less if to a direct port. The Belle of Bath sailed yesterday. The Union Pacific is said to have charged the British ship Parthenope, \$2800 for towing her off the sands near Tanzy Point when the vessel lost one of her anchors last week. The British bark Cumberland, 1653 tons, arrived in port yesterday from San Diego, after a passage of twenty-eight days. She came in ballast, and went up the river shortly after her arrival here. The suit grew out of the issuing of a permit by ex-Auditor Jewett to a property owner who wished to personally let a contract for the improvement of a certain portion of a public street chargeable to him. The contract was let to Ross & Wirt, and the property owner left the state. Subsequently the property in question was bought in by the city at a delinquent tax sale, and Ross & Wirt claimed that the city was liable for the amount due them.
