John Hoberg yesterday proved up on his homestead claim to 160 acres at Seaside.

The long overdue bark, the *Alexander Black*, arrived from Panama yesterday she comes in ballast.

O. P. Henry, who was sent to the insane asylum at Salem a few weeks ago, died on Thursday.

Miss Ballard and J. W. Belcher will sing a solo at the services in the M. E. church tomorrow evening.

The British ship *Peter Iredale*, hence for Queenstown with wheat, was spoken November 4th in latitude 8 north, longitude 113 west.

There will be the usual services in the German language at the Congregational church on Sunday afternoon at 2:30. J. G. Schmid, Pastor.

Charles Lawrence, who robbed a man named Mastick in the resort kept by John Stephenson in the western end of town, was bound over in the sum of \$200 yesterday by Judge Osburn to await the action of the grand jury.

It was learned yesterday that the occupants of the *Ward's boat*, which was picked up off Smith's Point on Thursday, were Charles Hayburg and Tom Head, two of the employees of the cannery. They got ashore when the boat was upset.

At the Norwegian Evangelical Lutheran church, Uppertown, service will be held as usual on Sunday next, the 1st Sunday of Advent, at 11 a. m., and 7:30 p. m. Sunday school at 9:30 a. m. Rev. L. Nissen, pastor.

The little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Thompson of Seaside, who was lost in the woods on Wednesday last, has not yet been heard from. The parents have despaired of finding her alive, and the impression is general that she has been drowned.

A grand literary and musical social will be given by the ladies of the M. E. church congregation on the 9th inst., beginning at 8 p. m. There will be supper furnished, for which, with admission to the entertainment, the low figure of 25 cents will be charged.

There will be services at the Congregational church tomorrow morning and evening. Subject of the morning discourse, "What are the evidences of a Christian life?" Evening subject: "What is it to follow Christ?" The Sunday school meets at 12 m., and the Christian Endeavor at 6:30 p. m.

The offerings made at the union Thanksgiving services in the Presbyterian church for the Portland Hospital have been received by that institution. There was in cash, \$12.50, and \$14 worth of fruits, canned goods and vegetables. The three barrels of provisions were delivered by the City of Frankfort without charge.

The convention of Oregon sheriffs will meet at the Court House in this city today at 10 a. m. It is expected that about twenty will be present, among whom are: Sheriff Knight of Marion, Noble of Morrow, Noland of Lane, Ford of Washington, Warren of Yamhill, Leslie of Crook, Ward of Wasco, Conde of Baker, Vice-President George Downing, Kelly, of Multnomah, Ganong of Clackamas, and others.

Sheriff Masie, of Columbia county, has disappeared, and with him has gone about \$4,000 of the county's funds. He collected about \$13,000 in taxes, and it is said, turned in but \$3,000. He has not been seen since Friday last, when Sheriff Kelley, of Multnomah, met him on Third street in Portland. He had about \$1000 worth of county warrants when he left. He was elected by the people's party last year, and took possession of his office on July 5th, 1892. His bondsmen, of whom there are thirteen, will be sued for the amount of the discrepancy.

Yesterday's Oregonian contains a long letter from Hon. C. W. Fulton, replying to Senator Cogswell's remarks upon the vote on the Durham bill at the last session of the legislature. It is scarcely likely that Mr. Cogswell will make any reply for the simple reason that there was no ground for discussion. Mr. Fulton shows clearly that his ruling was correct, and that there being a quorum present (including those who did not vote, but who were counted as voting in the negative) the sixteen votes in the affirmative were sufficient to pass the bill.

In the Methodist Episcopal church tomorrow there will be a class meeting at 10 a. m., at 11 a. m., sermon by the pastor, Rev. J. W. Rushong, D. D. Subject: A Model Church of the Nineteenth Century—a Picture Worth Seeing. At 7:30 p. m., Young People's Rally, to which all young people are cordially invited.
