A Seattle lumber correspondent sends the following: Shingle and lumber shipments from this section are still hampered by the car famine. The Seattle, Lake Shore and Eastern road is short about 400 cars in its orders, but it was assisted by the Canadian Pacific road which furnished twenty-five cars a few days ago. The Canadian road only charges terminal rates to the manufacturers along the Lake Shore road, absorbing the five-cent local rate. There are now over 7,000,000 feet of logs lying in the vicinity of the Snohomish river, over 4,000,000 being in the boom at its mouth, 2,000,000 within five miles of its mouth, and 1,000,000 near the mouth of the tributary, Tahooya.
