FOR THE JAPAN COAST.

The Steam-Schooner Olsen Ready for Her Long Cruise.

The sailing schooner Louis Olsen is almost ready for sea, and will probably leave port this afternoon or Sunday. Captain Guillemin is anxious to get away and begin operations, and nearly all the necessary preparations for the extended cruise have been made. The cabin has been increased in size, making the former rather cramped quarters quite commodious. The Olsen carries six hunting boats, and the hunter, three of whom came from Victoria, B. C., and two from Yakima, are as expert with the rifle and shot gun as any on the coast. They purchased their arms, about twenty pieces in all, together with the ammunition, which included a ton of buckshot, at the store of A. G. Spexarth. The weapons were tried yesterday, and the men expressed themselves as highly satisfied with them. The Olsen goes to the coast of Japan and the captain expects to be gone about ten months.
