Eastern manufacturers of spool cotton have concluded that they will be forced out of business if the Wilson bill belaw. Recent statistics show that with a duty of seven cents per dozen, English manufacturers of this commodity have increased their exports to the United States more than 100,000 dozen since the McKinley bill went into operation, from which it is apparent that they have found some method whereby they can still sell at a profit in competition with the maunfacturers in this country. But it is proposed to reduce the duty on spool cotton to 41/2 cents a dozen, or one-fifth of a cent per spool. As the English manufacturers are able to sell their goods in the markets of this country at the present higher rate of duty, the proposed reduction will, of course, enable them to secure our entire trade at a good profit to themselves, but it will effectually kill the American industry unless the labor employed to our cotton mills will agree to a reduction of 35 per cent in wages. which is the difference between the

present and the proposed tariffs. Some little agitation was made in the East in favor of retaining in this coun-
