

THE WORK OF CONGRESS

A Date Fixed for a Vote on the Wilson Bill.

Washington, Jan. 8.—The democrats succeeded in mustering a quorum in the house this morning. The demand for the previous question on taking up the tariff bill was carried—189 to none, ten more than a quorum. Thirty minutes' debate was allowed under the rules. Washington, Jan. 8.—In the senate the Hawaiian question was taken up. Chandler introduced a new Hawaiian resolution, and the Hoar resolution about Blount's salary came up in the regular order. Gorman mover its reference to the foreign relations committee. Hoar objected.

Hoar's resolution was referred to the committee on foreign affairs. The senate then went into executive session.

Turpie presented a resolution declaring the project of the annexation of Hawaii inexpedient, and should be no further considered, and that "it is of the highest international interest that the government of Hawaii be allowed to pursue its own line of policy." The resolution went over till tomorrow. Frye attempted to secure a vote on his resolution declaring against American interference at Hawaii, but Butler objected and the resolution went over until Wednesday.

The special order fixing the 29th instant for the vote on the Wilson bill, was adopted by a vote of 175 to 1.

The preliminaries having thus been settled, Chairman Wilson, of the ways and means committee, arose and opened the debate on the tariff bill.

SHORT IN HIS ACCOUNTS.

A Defaulting Bank Cashier Attempts to Commit Suicide.

Cofax, Washington, Jan. 8.—C. F. Russell, cashier of the First National Bank, was found today in Anterson's Masonic Hall, in a semi-conscious condition. Doctors were summoned and worked with him, and he is now in a fair way to recover. Russell says he took poison last night and begs that he be allowed to die. The bank examiner discovered some irregularities. Russell said he could explain. He disappeared Sunday afternoon. Investigation showed he had taken \$1000 with him. It was first thought he had left the country, but a drug clerk remembered having sold him an ounce of laudanum, and search was instituted with the above result. The amount of Russell's default is not given. This morning the bank began suit to recover \$10,000.

McKINLEY'S INAUGURATION.

Columbus, Ohio, Jan. 8.—Governor McKinley's second inauguration today was, as usual in this state, more of a social than a political event. Leading democrats had prominent positions in connection with the ceremonies. The governor abstained from any partisan references in his inaugural address, confining himself entirely to the condition of the state.

A DARING BURGLARY.

Chicago, Jan. 8.—Three robbers today entered Samuel Greenburg's pawn shop. They bound and gagged the clerk, who was the only person in the shop, and did likewise to a little girl who came in while the robbery was going on. They then rifled the safe of \$10,000 worth of diamonds, money and watches, and made good their escape.

Des Moines, Ia., Jan. 8.—The legislature met today. Permanent officers of both houses will be nominated this afternoon and elected tomorrow. All will be republicans.
