SALMON MARKETS.

A Good Trade in Alaska Fish Expected in Chicago.

The Herald of Trade has the followng to say regarding the salmon market The market is uninteresting, with the situation virtually unchanged. The Emma Claudina arrived on December 30, having on board 876 barrels of Aliska salmon, consigned to William Brown & Co.

The last vessels to leave Victoria, B

C., with canned salmon are Candida December 22, carrying 50,318 cases, and the Primere, December 17, with 24,660 cases. This makes a total for the pres ent season of nine vessels, carrying 343, 329 cases. One vessel, the Harold, a last mail advices, was still in port load ing. She will take in about 55,000 cases J. K. Armsby Co. report in their Chi cago circular as follows: There is quita little move in Alaska salmon, and we look for a good trade after the first of the year in that article. Stocks generally in the jobbers 'are light, and the stock in California has been very nuch reduced during the past few months. There has been some very heavy European sales, and those have lessened the stocks very materially There is no question but what price

will be sustained if not advanced. A press telegram from New Westmin ster, B. 
