The British ship Star of Austria has finished loading wheat in Portland.

J. Jackson, who fell from the roadway to the beach a few days ago, and broke his shoulder, is recovering rapidly.

The steamship Columbia arrived from San Francisco yesterday, bringing a considerable quantity of freight for this port.

The steamer General Canby is now running as a passenger boat between Seattle and Port Orchard, making one round trip daily.

Herman Schoene and Gustav L. J. Zeigler, both natives of Germany, were admitted to citizenship by the county court yesterday.

The steamer Lakme came down from Portland yesterday, and will sail today, weather permitting, for Redondo, with 700,000 feet of lumber.

THE MARSHFIELD RAFT.

It Will Play an Important Part in the North Pacific Chart.

Lieutenant Calkins, of the branch hydrographic office, states that material is being gathered for the February issue of the North Pacific pilot chart, and in speaking of the great log raft, portions of which have been encountered 130 miles from where it broke up, the lieutenant says:

"It is to be hoped that these logs will be washed ashore north of Cape Blanco, as the current at that point goes inshore. There is a strong current setting along the coast to the northward and eastward, and when the raft broke up it set out with the southerly gale, it would put the logs ashore near Friday, but it did not. The logs are now in the limits of the Davidson in-shore counter current. This is the one that sets to the northward along the coast. Further out once—about 30 miles—is a

current flowing to the southward. With several thousand logs floating about in that region, it follows as a matter of course that a great number of them will set out and down the coast until they become water-logged and sink. As for sending a steamer out to tow them in, such a task would be a herculean one. The unfortunate experience of the Coos Bay enterprise should be a warning against towing rafts at sea during the winter months."
