AT REST.

The Remains of Captain Olsen Laid Away.

One of the largest, if not the largest, funeral concourse ever seen in the city attended the funeral of Captain Olsen yesterday afternoon. The services were held in K. of P. Hall, and were under the immediate charge of Astor Lodge No. 6, K. of P., of which Brother Adolph Johnson is chancellor commander. The Masters and Pilots' Association and Seaside Lodge No. 12, A. O. U. W., and members of the other lodges of the A. O. U. W., turned out in a body to assist Astor Lodge in laying Bro. Olsen to rest. The services in the lodge room were conducted by the Rev. W. S. Short, pastor of Grace Episcopal church of this city. The solemn and beautiful liturgy of that church was read in an impressive manner by Mr. Short. The choir, composed of members of Seaside Lodge, sang the following hymns: "Rock of Ages," "We Shall Know Each Other Better," "Nearer My God to Thee," and "Jesus Lover of my Soul." The beautiful words of the hymn "When the Mists Have Rolled Away," were sung as a solo by Bro. S. Kozar, of Seaside Lodge, in a touching and tender manner. After singing the last hymn, the remains were viewed by several hundred people. Many floral offerings were placed upon the coffin; one of the most beautiful of which was a model of the steamer "Polar Bear," on which Captain Olsen had made several trips to Alaska. The owners of the steamer, recognizing his faithfulness and ability, had this model made as a memorial of him. It was composed of flowers, bedded in a large mass of fragrant buds, vines and blossoms, and had the American flag flying at the peak. It was a tribute of respect to the departed navigator, that speaks equally for the heads and hearts of those who employed him. After the services in the lodge room were ended, the secret associations of which Captain Olsen was a member formed upon the street, accompanied by a large number of friends, and proceeded by the band of J. G. Stutz, marched to the boat, which was to convey the remains to the cemetery. Three steamers had been chartered to take the remains of Brother Olsen, his family, and a large number of his friends to Greenwood, where the body was to be interred.

The line of march was down Third street to Main, down Main to Second, and up Second to the steamer landing. As soon as the procession started the band played "Eventide," and on arriving at the landing played Handel's beautiful anthem, "The Dead March in Saul." As soon as the head of the procession had reached the landing a halt was made and the line opened to permit of the passage of the pall-bearers and those of the deceased relatives and friends who were behind the coffin. The order of march was as follows: First came the marshal, Past Chancellor of the Knights of Pythias, Alex. Campbell, and Manager Stutz, bandmaster. Then followed the members of the band, the Uniform Rank, No. 1, Knights of Pythias, members of Astor and Pacific Lodges, K. of P., about fifty strong; members of Columbia Harbor No. 22, Steamboat Masters and Pilots, about thirty strong; members of Seaside Lodge, No. 12, A. O. U. W., to the number of 32. Then came the pall-bearers with the coffin, and following the latter were a large number of friends and acquaintances of the deceased.

The pall-bearers were twelve in number, as follows: T. Floyd, Geo. Kaboth, T. P. Noonan, and O. F. Morton from Seaside Lodge; O. I. Peterson, Captain Charles Carlson, C. Ahnes, and Captain H. G. Havens, from the Steamboat Masters and Pilots' Association; Chris. Evenson, M. Knutson, E. E. Shaw and Alfred Olsen, from the Knights of Pythias.

The band while marching to the boat, and on their way to the cemetery, played the following selections: "Dead March in Saul," "Handel's Funeral March," "Lake View," "Pettie's 'Rocked in the Cradle of the Deep,'" "Scruane," "Eventide," "Ripple." At the cemetery Rev. W. S. Short finished the services of the Episcopal church, and the Knights of Pythias' beautiful ritual was then read by P. G. C. A. A. Cleveland. At the close of the reading of the ritual of the K. of P., Brother Cleveland made a short and feeling address, and spoke words of sympathy and comfort to the bereaved wife, promising her the fraternal protection of the lodges of the K. of P. of this city, now that the sheltering arm of her protector had been taken from her. As the sods of the valley were being placed upon the coffin, the large gathering of people slowly wended their way to the boat, leaving Brother John M. Olsen where we must all one day lie, in a silent grave. And there awaiting the judgment day, trusting in the love and mercy of an infinite God and tender Father, we leave thee, friend, brother, husband, rest in peace.

Rest weary head; Lie down to slumber in the peaceful tomb; Light from above has broken through; its gloom; Here in the place where once thy Savior lay; Where he shall wake thee on a future day. Like a tired child upon its mother's breast. Rest, sweetly rest.
