Six applications for positions in the postoffice, two for clerks and four for carriers, have been received by Secretary Pruel, of the civil service commission. The examinations will be held on February 10th.

Postmaster General Bissell has invited new bids for carrying the mail on the Astoria-Seaside route. This contract was bid upon some weeks ago. H. A. Lawton, of Astoria, Kan., being the lowest bidder. The price asked was \$3,874, which the department considers too high.

LOGGING ON THE NEHALEM. A party of loggers consisting of Hugh Frazier and four others came down the south fork of the Nehalem river from Meshawaka, thirty-five miles, with 150,000 feet of fir and spruce logs, says the Nehalem Times. The logs were started during the freshet, and four men started behind them in a big flat-bottomed scow. They made the run from Frazier's place, a distance of twenty-five miles, in two and one-half hours. At the gorge the river narrows up and when they came through they report the water full thirty-five feet above the medium stage of water, and from the mouth of this gorge to the mouth of the Fraser river in British Columbia. COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS. Seven-Mills Tax for County Purposes—One-Half Mill for Roads.

The county court met yesterday morning. Present—C. A. McGuire, judge; H. Carruthers and R. M. Wooden, commissioners, and C. J. Trenchard, clerk. An order was made admitting to citizenship A. Nohrn, a native of Germany. Carl Anslund, a native of Norway, was also granted final citizenship papers.

A sub-committee from the taxpayers' committee of thirty appeared and argued on the matter of the tax levy for the year ending June 30, 1894.

A communication from the committee of thirty in regard to the return of H. Hendrickson, from San Francisco was read and filed.

The matter of the tax levy was then brought up and it was decided to fix the levy at seven mills for county purposes and five-tenths mill for roads. An order was made that the tax be levied, and so extended by the clerk.

In September last the roll figured up \$2,464,717, and estimating the expenses of the county for the year at \$40,999, a tax was levied as follows: For county purposes, 12 mills; roads, 1 1/2 mills; schools, 5 mills, making 19 1/2 mills in all. On January 18th, after the state levy had been made, and when the assessment had been raised to \$4,662,737, the court proposed to levy—for county purposes, 9 2/10 mills; roads, 1 1/2 mills; state, 4 3/10 mills, and for schools, 5 mills, or 20 mills in all. The committee from the taxpayers asked that for

county purposes seven mills be levied, and for roads, 5-10 mill, which, with the 4 3/10 mills for state purposes and five mills for schools, will make the total tax for the year 16 8-10 mills. The resignation of C. W. Carnahan as superintendent of Road District No. 2 was read and accepted, and C. S. Carruthers appointed in his stead. A resolution was introduced to ask the secretary of war to allow the bridge to be built across Young's Bay. Adopted. The court then adjourned.

Lowther, who has been rendering such valuable assistance during the past two weeks, was called away, and leaves on this morning's boat.
