

LOCAL AND GENERAL

The city council meets this evening. The steamer Signal went up the river Sunday. The pilot schooner came in yesterday morning for supplies. The schooner Saddle arrived in from San Francisco yesterday. The bark Coloma arrived at Hong Kong on Friday last, 67 days out. A son and heir was born on Sunday afternoon to the wife of A. J. Gragg. The British ship Holyrood has not yet crossed out, but will probably sail today. The British bark Earlscourt, hence with grain, has been ordered to Havre to discharge. The steamer Elmore arrived in from Tillamook yesterday afternoon, bringing 1000 cases of salmon and a quantity of dairy products. The steamship Queen sailed yesterday for San Francisco. From this port she took 700 cases salmon, 27 sacks of oysters, 25 boxes of fish, and 28 packages of sundries. The Ladies' Guild of Grace church will give a tea Wednesday from 2 to 5, p. m., at Mrs. Chas. Rogers, corner Main and Astor streets. All are cordially invited. The case of the United States vs. Norris Staples, charged with cutting timber on the land of E. P. Parker, will come up this afternoon at 2 o'clock in the justice court. The British ship Clan McPherson, 1591 tons, Captain Rome, which was on the list of shipping en route to the Sound, was reported outside last evening with a pilot on board, having received orders to load at this port. She comes from Tocopolia. An outhouse belonging to Barth Wall, which stood about 50 feet south of his residence, has changed its location, and is now engaged in a slow race for the beach with the collapsed dwelling. The slide has carried it to where the residence formerly stood. The examination in the DeForce burglary case was continued by Justice Cleveland yesterday until Thursday, by consent of the prosecution and the defendants. The boy's mother and W. B. Painter have furnished bonds in one of the cases against him, and in the other, G. W. Morton and Mrs. DeForce, have signed the bonds.

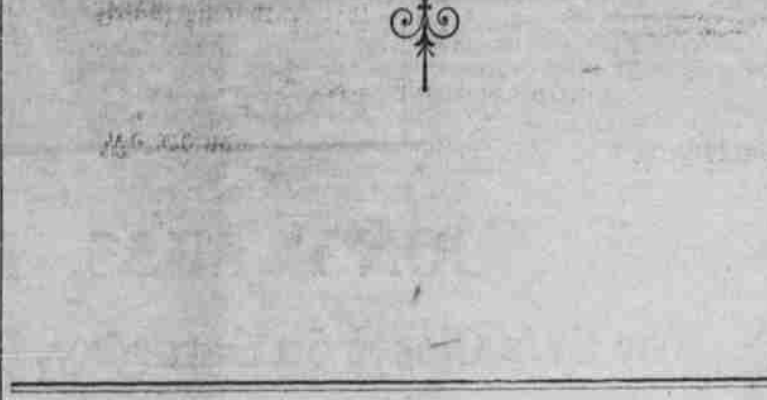
