

## ABOUT THE CITY.

The steamer Elmore sailed yesterday for Tillamook.

The steamship Columbia will sail tomorrow for San Francisco.

The steamer Harrison crossed out yesterday afternoon, bound for Tillamook.

The ship John Cook, which finished loading in Portland on Thursday, is on the way down the river.

Anyone having a house of six or more rooms to let can find a good tenant by applying at The Astorian office.

The schooner Novelty, Capt. Lewis, cleared yesterday for Valparaiso with 565,502 feet of lumber, valued at \$4,241.26.

Notices have been posted by Street Superintendent Chadwick stating that the Alderbrook roadway is dangerous for travel.

There will be the usual services in the German language at the Congregational church this afternoon at 2:30. J. G. Schmidt, pastor.

The collection of county taxes was begun by the sheriff yesterday morning, the first to pay being Capt. Phil Johnson, of this city, who contributed \$140.45 toward the support of the county.

There will be services today at the Norwegian Evangelical Lutheran church, above Columbia cannery, Uppertown, at 11 a. m. and 7:30 p. m., Rev. L. Nissen, officiating. All are welcome. The next service will be the first Sunday after Easter, the first Sunday of April.

A deed was filed yesterday for record by which E. J. Ford conveyed to E. L. Dwyer a one-quarter interest in the east half of the Donation Land Claim of Bartholomew C. Kindred and Rachel Kindred, in township 8, north of range 10 west. The consideration was \$20,000. The property adjoins the town-site of Flavel.

Nils Olsen, a native of Sweden, was yesterday admitted to citizenship. The last previous naturalization papers were issued on January 3, and in this connection it is worthy of note that two years ago the admissions between January 3 and March 3 aggregated 51. A like number were also admitted for the same time in 1891.

In a notice of the meetings at which Mr. Braekhus has been speaking it was stated that he was holding forth at the Norwegian Lutheran church. This was erroneous, as The Astorian is informed that he has been speaking at the Bethany Norwegian Lutheran church, which belongs to the Dano-Norwegian conference, an off-shoot of the Norwegian Lutheran church, but which, on account of some difference in scriptural teachings, is not considered as true Lutheran.

Advices received from Port Stanley, Falkland Islands, state that considerable wreckage, apparently not more than three weeks in the water, had been washed ashore there, including a piece marked "Loch Urr," and a life-buoy marked "Bombay, of Fleetwood." The Loch Urr was posted at Lloyds as missing two months ago, having sailed from the Tyne for Valparaiso in May last. The iron bark Bombay, 952 tons, sailed from Lobos di Afuera for London on November 11 with a cargo of guano.

The wedding of Horace D. Thing and Miss Rosetta Sherman took place yesterday afternoon at the residence of the bride's parents, Rev. Dr. Garner officiating. The affair was private, the only witnesses present being the relatives of the bride and Miss Maud Warren and E. G. Rogers, who officiated as bridesmaid and best man. The happy young couple left on the Telephone for Portland last evening, en route to California, where they will remain for a month.

The principal topic among river cannermen is still the probability of the successful combination mentioned in The Astorian some days ago. It is generally believed that the outlook for a strong and workable association is more promising than ever before. There is a good deal of speculation concerning the ultimate fate of the plants operated by Messrs. Scocher & Gibbs, and already it is stated that if the combine is effected the work of packing salmon during the coming season will be distributed among only three or four canneries.

Following upon the report by the owner of the British bark Trafalgar, of Glasgow, lately arrived at Melbourne, from Batavia, in charge of the third mate, the captain and other officers having all died at sea, the committee of Lloyd's has awarded a bronze medal for meritorious services to William Shotton, third officer; Hugh Kennedy, sailmaker, and John Lee, steward, of this vessel. The government of Victoria also presented Mr. Shotton with a gold watch and chain and Mr. Kennedy with a silver watch and chain in recognition of their conduct in navigating the Trafalgar under circumstances of an exceptionally trying nature.

"The Pearl of Savoy" will be put on by the Skitts company tomorrow night, by special request, and continued for three nights. This piece has become a favorite with the theater-goers of Astoria, and will no doubt draw good houses. E. Alma Struts will again delight the audience with her violin solos, which alone will no doubt draw many people. On Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights "Old Home, or Over the Hills to the Poor House," a powerful drama that has been played with great success throughout the east, will be presented. The final production of the river season was witnessed last night by a large and enthusiastic audience. The play was nicely staged and the characters were well sustained.

## AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION.

Prof. Bloss' Lecture at the Congregational Church Last Evening.

The lecture last evening by Prof. J. M. Bloss, of Corvallis, was greatly appreciated by the University Extension class.

It was upon the subject of "Agricultural Education," giving a specific description of the work done by the college at Corvallis. And it was a revelation to know how extensive that work now is. The college is more exactly a polytechnic school, of which agricultural training is but one department. It embraces also a mechanical department, including wood, iron and machine work; photography, engraving and printing; a department for young ladies, in which sewing, cooking, house-keeping and hygienic living are taught, and the United States experiment station. All students perform labor an hour a day, and pursue a definite progressive course in manual training, along with their other studies. The considerable funds, derived from avails of certain lands, together with state appropriation and the United States appropriation for the experiment station, furnish the basis for a great institution.

President Bloss brought and left specimens of work done by the students, which will swell the museum of the Astoria high school.

This evening he delivers an address at the Congregational church upon "Science and Religion as the Elements of Progress," and tomorrow evening the lecture will be upon the "Effects of the Civil War Upon Education."

President Bloss, with his intensely keen and practical mind, his plain and vigorous handling of his subjects, and his quaint and friendly humor, is easily one of the most interesting speakers that have visited Astoria. He is accompanied by Mrs. Bloss, whose acquaintance, as well as that of the president, the members of the class were delighted to make.

## A DIFFICULT TASK.

The Manzanita made another attempt yesterday to discharge the cargo of 29 tons of coal on the lightship, but owing to the heavy swell was unable to make the transfer. To do the work it is necessary to employ only small boats, and at the present time of year it is here where the difficulty lies. The stupid conclusions of the Tacoma papers that the lighthouse tenders have been bar-bound for several weeks only show their absolute ignorance of the condition of things, and their quickness to seize on an untruth and expatiate on its moral in order to boom their own vicinity. Puget Sound, minus its soup kitchens, breakneck city stites and teredoes would really be a habitable place.

## ORDINANCE NO. —.

An Ordinance Providing for Taxing, Licensing and Regulating Bar-Rooms and Drinking Shops and

Places Where Liquors Are

Sold Within the City

of Astoria.

The City of Astoria does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That no person or persons shall, in the City of Astoria, Clatsop County, Oregon, either directly or indirectly, in person or by another, sell, transfer or deliver, or knowingly permit to be sold by another, or for or on his account, or otherwise, any wine, malt or spirituous liquors in less quantities than one gallon, without first obtaining a license to do so from the City of Astoria, in the manner in this ordinance hereinafter provided. Provided, that nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to apply to the sale of liquors for medicinal purposes, made by a regular licensed pharmacist upon a prescription therefor made by a regular licensed physician or surgeon, in the regular course of such physician's or surgeon's practice to a patient, and for medicinal purposes only.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before the City of Astoria, shall be fined not less than Twenty-five Dollars, nor more than Two Hundred Dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail until such fine be paid, not to exceed One Hundred days. And it is hereby made the duty of the Chief of Police and each police officer of the City of Astoria to make complaint to the City Attorney of each and every violation of the provisions of this ordinance, and such violation must be prosecuted by such attorney.

Section 2. Every person applying for a license to sell wine, malt or spirituous liquors, in less quantities than one gallon, under the provisions of this ordinance, shall pay into the city treasury the sum of Four Hundred Dollars per annum, and in no case shall any license be issued for a less period than one year, and no license shall be in any manner transferable. Provided, further, that the Common Council shall reserve and have the right to revoke a license at any time.

Section 3. Before a license shall issue, as provided in this ordinance, the applicant shall petition the Common Council in the manner provided in Section 4 of this ordinance, and shall also, with said petition, present to the Common Council a bond in the sum of Five Hundred Dollars, with two or more sufficient sureties, payable to the City of Astoria, conditioned that the applicant shall keep an orderly house, and will in all things comply with the provisions of this ordinance during the period of one year from the date of such license. Attached to said bond shall be the affidavit, verified by the oath of the sureties, to the effect that they are free holders of the City of Astoria, and are in the aggregate worth the sum of One Thousand Dollars over and above all just debts and liabilities, exclusive of property exempt from execution. The applicant shall also present with such petition and bond, a receipt of the City Treasurer for the amount of money deposited for such license, to-wit, \$400.

Section 4. The petition required by this ordinance shall state:

1st—The name of the applicant.

2nd—Whether such applicant has before this day held a license of the same application, a license, and if so, at what time such license has or does expire.

3rd—The number and street where such house is situated where the liquors are to be sold.

Such petition shall be verified by the applicant, or by more than one, then by one of said applicants, stating that such petition is true.

The receipt of the Treasurer mentioned in Section 3 of this ordinance shall state that the amount paid by such applicant is paid for liquor license, and refunded in case the Common Council shall refuse to grant the petition of the applicant, otherwise upon the issuing of such license to go into the Police Fund of said City of Astoria.

Section 5. Said petition shall be granted on condition of the approval of the bond by the Mayor, and said Mayor shall examine the bond of the applicant, and either approve or disapprove the same. Upon the provisions of this ordinance being complied with, the Auditor and Police Judge shall issue such license to such applicant.

Section 6. The peace bond given by the applicant, as provided in this ordinance, in case of any violation of its provisions or conditions, shall be liable to be prosecuted therefor in a civil action, and it shall be the duty of the City Attorney to prosecute the bond given by such applicant for any violation of its provisions.

Section 7. Any keeper of a bar-room or drinking shop, or place where liquors are sold, who shall permit any breach of the peace or disturbance of public order or decorum, by noisy or disorderly conduct on the premises, when it is in his power to prevent the same, or who shall sell or give any intoxicating liquors to any person already intoxicated, or any person under the age of legal majority, or who shall allow or permit any minor to remain in or about any bar-room or drinking shop, or place where liquors are sold, or who shall permit any theatrical or minstrel show, exhibition or concert to take place in such bar-room or drinking shop, or place where liquors are sold, or who shall permit any minor to be or remain in any theatre or place of amusement in which intoxicating liquors are sold, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before the Police Court, shall be fined not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail not less than twelve nor more than fifty days, or both, in the discretion of the court, and shall forfeit the license to such bar-room, or drinking shop or place where liquors are sold.

Section 8. Each and every place where wines, malt or spirituous liquors are sold, bartered or delivered, shall be deemed a bar-room, or drinking-shop or place where liquors are sold, under the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 9. Each and every person having a license under the provisions of this ordinance shall exhibit the same at all times, while the same is in force, in his or their place of business, and persons violating the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction thereof before the Auditor and Police Judge, be fined not to exceed fifty dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail not to exceed twenty-five days.

Section 10. Ordinance No. 1322, entitled "An ordinance providing for licensing and regulating bar-rooms and drinking shops within the corporate limits of the City of Astoria, Clatsop County, Oregon," approved March 11th, 1891, be and the same is hereby repealed.

Section 11. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the Mayor, or President of the Council.
