SAN FRANCISCO'S BAR.

Serious Loss Caused by the Striking of the Ship Undaunted.

The accident to the American ship Undaunted, which struck on the bar at the entrance to San Francisco harbor on Monday last, will go a long way toward establishing the claim that the Columbia river entrance is the safest on the coast. The Undaunted is a ship nearly 25 years old. She was built in 1869, by E. H. Sewall, at Bath, Me. She is 267.3 feet in length, 41.1 feet in breadth of beam and 11.7 feet in depth of hold. When loaded, as she was on Monday, she draws over 25 feet of water, says the Chronicle. Steamboat men and shipmasters say that a vessel should not venture over the bar, unless it is very smooth, drawing more than 22 or 23 feet of water.

Ships drawing over 24 feet have frequently crossed out to sea from the Columbia, and that, too, at half tide. Engineer Hegardt, who has had soundings taken quite recently at the entrance to the Columbia river, says there is a depth of water of 31 feet at dead low tide, a fact which speaks volumes for the success of the Jetty.

The Undaunted is now being unloaded, and it is thought the damage is serious from the manner in which the water was pouring into her.

WILL GIVE NO OPINION.

Judge Langhorne Declines to Criticize a Decision of Judge McBride.

A letter from Judge Langhorne contains the following self-explanatory passage relative to the recent decision by Judge McBride in the case of State of Oregon vs. Olson. The judge writes: "My opinion has been asked by several citizens of this state, since the decision in question, as to the jurisdiction of the Oregon courts, within the boundaries of the state of Washington, bordering on the Columbia river. I do not think it proper for me to express any opinion whatsoever on the subject; it will be time enough when a similar case arises within my jurisdiction. In the event of a conflict of jurisdiction between the two states, the federal courts can easily dispose of the matter.
