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UNITED AMERICAN MECHANICS.

Deputy State Organizer W. P. Fought Visiting the City.

Deputy State Organizer Fought, of the Junior Order of United American Mechanics, arrived in town yesterday for the purpose of organizing a local branch of the order. The organization is similar in many respects to the American Protective Association, if one may judge from the declaration of principles, copies of which have been distributed.

Following are one or two paragraphs from the "Declaration of Principles": "We guarantee to every man the liberty of worshipping God according to the dictates of his own conscience, and would give every assistance to protect all in the exercise of this liberty, but we object most strenuously to the interference of any church, no matter under what name it may exist, in the temporal affairs of this country.

"We believe that the Bible should be read in our public schools; not to teach sectarianism, but to inculcate its teachings. It is the recognized standard of all moral and civil law. We therefore believe that our children should be educated in its teachings, but that no dogma or creed should be taught at the same time."

Mr. Fought had not taken any active step toward the formation of a branch here further than to become acquainted, but will remain for a day or two and may find some who approve of the objects of the organization.
