INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS.

General Meeting of the Football Club Last Evening.

A general meeting of the Astoria Football club was held in the gymnasium last evening. President Finlayson made a few remarks, after which the minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved.

Ex-President Finlayson then called upon the new president, G. C. Fulton, to take the chair, and hoped that under his guidance the club would continue to grow until it was the greatest institution of the kind on the Pacific Coast.

President Fulton then took the chair and was warmly applauded. He stated that he was familiar with the objects of the club, and had watched its steady growth since its inception. During his term it would, he said, be his object to promote the interests of the club, as far as lay in his power.

Secretary Gunn then read the following letter:

Astoria, March 27, 1894.

The Astoria Football and Athletic Club—Gentlemen: The state democratic convention for Oregon has been appointed to meet in this city, commencing April 17, and it is expected will bring here many people from all parts of the state. To the end that the visitors may carry away with them pleasing recollections of their visit, and that the already fair fame of our city in the direction of extending every courtesy and hospitality to visitors be thereby promoted, I have been instructed by the committee having the matter in charge to solicit your assistance on the program to be prepared for their entertainment. We believe that an exhibition under your auspices, similar to the one recently given by you, for which we will be pleased to provide a full orchestra accompaniment, would prove a very interesting and entertaining event. I would therefore respectfully request that you give us such an entertainment on the evening of Tuesday, April 17. Venturing the hope that this suggestion may merit some favorable consideration, I have the honor to remain, very respectfully yours,

S. C. LEWIS, Secretary Clatsop Democratic Club.

President Fulton took the floor and said that within the club no political party or creed was known, and he for one was heartily in favor of entertaining any delegation visiting the city. The strangers, Mr. Fulton said, were all representative men of the state, and as the club was an institution which had the means of doing much to assist in entertaining visitors on such occasions as the one referred to, he thought that every member should feel it a duty incumbent upon him to help in every manner possible to make the strangers feel that Astoria had the means of entertaining guests, and that the people as a whole were interested in making visitors feel that Astoria hospitality is all that has been claimed for it.

President Fulton closed by assuring the members that he would do everything in his power to make the affair the success which he was certain it would be.

A motion was made that the matter be left in the hands of the executive committee, and an amendment was offered that the secretary be instructed to notify Secretary Lewis, of the democratic county committee, that the club would give the proposed entertainment, and do its utmost to amuse the visiting delegates. The motion as amended was carried.

A circular letter was read from the First Regiment Athletic Association, of Portland, announcing that an outdoor meeting would be given on the 13th of April, and giving a list of the events for the occasion. The matter was referred to the executive committee.

A communication was read from Geo. D. Baird, secretary of the Pacific Association of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States, suggesting that the Football club become a member of the association, and showing the advantages to be derived thereby, as follows: Being one of the Brotherhood of Pacific Association clubs; having a representative on the board of managers of the association; having part in the management of amateur athletics in this locality and the United States. The communication was referred to the executive committee, with power to act.

Upon motion it was decided that in future all members of the Football club should pay dues toward the support of the gymnasium.

A motion was then carried that all those who formerly belonged to the Football club become the institution of the gymnasium, but who had not contributed toward the support of the latter, be accorded the privileges of the gymnasium upon payment of the regular dues from date.

It was moved that all members of the club be charged the regular admission fee to all games of football held during the season. An amendment was offered that payment of admission fee by members be made optional. An amendment to the amendment was offered, to the effect that all members be admitted free except when the games are being played for the benefit of any public institution.

After prolonged discussion the original motion was carried, the sentiment of the club being that no one who had been in the habit of attending the games of football objected to paying, when necessary, an admission fee of 25 cents.

It was decided to have portable raised corners made for the running track in the gymnasium as soon as practicable.

Upon motion the executive committee were instructed to select a suitable design for a club badge, and to secure samples of uniforms for the football team.
