Dr. Bushong's Sermon Delivered On Sunday Evening.

At the M. E. church Sunday evening the services were very interesting. The church was filled to its utmost capacity, including the gallery and class rooms. The singing by the choir was admirable, especially the rendition of the anthems "Rock of Ages" and "One Sweetly Solemn Thought."

The pastor, Dr. Bushong, took for his text Psalms xiv. 1: "The fool hath said in his heart, there is no God." His subject being the statement "That the flesh Heart and Brain of the Age Accept Christ," which statement was challenged in the newspapers. The doctor said in part:

What is infidelity? It is denominated unbelief. Infidels deny the Christian's God, and the Divine origin of the world as we see it. They undertake to tell us in substance that the world made itself. They deny the Divine origin of the Christian system, hence they tell us that all Christians are either liars or fools, when they say they know there is a reality in the Christian religion. The infidel's theory compels him to take this position. They deny that the civilizing influence of Christianity is anything more than human. What a task he has on his hands.

I brand infidelity as being a base corruptor of mankind. To judge of a system, one must see it at its best. We propose to judge infidelity in that way. Altho elected from her bosom all who professed infidelity. The downfall of Rome began with her infidelity with infidelity. France was flooded with infidel literature; a convention was called

to declare a new order of things; the first was to declare the throne of God overthrown; then to abolish the Christian Sabbath; changed the calendar, and proclaimed that "Death is an eternal sleep." This was out in the stone archway over the entrance to Pere in Chaise cemetery. They declared the era had come when intelligent men should cease to fear an Eternal One. They placed on a gilded throne one of the worst scoundrels in Paris, and declared this was their goddess. Infidelity had full sway. It was at its best. What was the harvest of this seed sown? I dare give the history here.

The first was the reign of terror, which was the reign of pure infidelity. This opened the gates to the most unbridled ambition and passion. It brought an abundant harvest of immorality. As a result of the terrible state of society, the same delegates, with some others added, held another convention, and re-elected God on His throne, and ordered the words "Death is an eternal sleep" removed from the archway. I brand infidelity as an assistant in corruption.

Communism, nihilism and anarchism are born and fostered in the hothed of infidelity. It ruthlessly robs humanity of the richest heritage bequeathed it—namely, faith in the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of Christ. It would say to the mourner, death is an eternal sleep. Eat, drink and be merry, for tomorrow thou diest. What has infidelity done to build up the world? Their hall in Boston was sold out by the sheriff. Gerard college had to relax its rules to get students.

The doctor closed by giving several incidents of the insincerity of leading infidels.
