## OREGON'S GOVERNOR.

The speech of Gov. Penoyer in opening the Populist campaign at Ashland on Saturday is noticeable only for the declaration which he makes that the evils from which the country is suffering "are not due to any particular adjustment of the tariff, but to the lack of sound money." He then describes "sound money" in exactly the same language any well-informed man of any political party would employ in referring to the same subject, and thus the governor ignores the real issue between the parties, which is not that silver should be continued as a circulating medium, but how it can be maintained on a parity with gold; and not one single idea or suggestion does the redoubtable governor make as to how this great problem can be solved. The declaration is significant, however, in showing a remarkable change of ideas on the part of the governor and his party, since it was no longer ago than the last campaign, when it was contended that the great cure-all for the ills which they then pretended to see was a change from the pernicious Republican policy of protective tariff.

Of course the governor rung the changes on the old shibboleth of his party about the rich and the poor, etc., and he commended the income tax theory as a most benevolent and equitable plan to make the rich pay all the taxes. He next proposed that the government of the United States join the very class he has heretofore labored so hard to prejudice and spite, and become a money lender and mort-

gage shark; omitting, however, any suggestion as to how the capital to start the government's pawnbroking venture was to be obtained, unless he intended to imply it could be confiscated from the rich. In this connection, he commended the benign and progressive government of enlightened Russia as an example to be followed. He contended that the effect of the government's appearance in the role of money lender would naturally tend to depreciate the rate of interest, but he said nothing of the thrifty habit of money borrowing, and the extension of the hopeful and inspiring farm mortgage that might be by that means also promoted. He made the intensely patriotic and veracious statement that the census reports show that 90 per cent of the people of this country are dependent upon the public charity of the remaining 10 per cent, and then the governor wound up this last installment of his agreeable and attractive method of advertising himself and his state with the asseveration that his first—i. e., his famous letter to Mr. Cleveland—was one of the most conscientious acts of his whole life, and again he failed to add to this sweet and interesting statement the further fact that said last aforesaid conscientious act had, in the judgment of some of the best informed men of the country, put back the hands on the clock of Oregon's development not less than ten years, and has kept, and will keep, millions of dollars out of the state which might have been borrowed on his low rate of interest as the governor would like to see the government established. And thus it is the Populist campaign opens.

The little coterie of self-constituted Democratic leaders, who succeeded by their combinations and conspiracy in accomplishing the overthrow of Sheriff Smith in yesterday's convention, may take the blessed union to their souls that while they were winning a great victory over a party opponent, they were at the same time digging the grave of the Democratic party in Clatsop county for a long time to come. Mr. Smith has made a good officer, and was worthy of very different treatment at the hands of his party, but what he loses another gains, as there can now be no question that Mr. James W. Hare will be the next sheriff of Clatsop county.

Senator Sherman has written a letter to Hon. E. G. Rathbone, the Republican candidate for congress in the Ohio district formerly represented by the late Hon. George W. Houk, saying: "I feel the deepest interest in your success, partly from my personal desire for your election, but chiefly because your election would be an indication of the public sentiment in your district on the great question of protection of American Industries. No reasonable man can doubt that the passage of the pending bill will deepen and intensify the existing disturbance of domestic industries in our country. The radical change proposed will necessarily provoke a struggle between capital and labor. It will cause the reduction of wages and the crippling, and in some cases the destruction, of industries that have been greatly advanced by the McKinley tariff act.

"The pending bill is purely a sectional measure, framed by three of four senators, all of whom represent states that have but little or no interest in manufactures. They have, to some extent, protected their local industries, but are absolutely indifferent to all employments but those of their respective states.

"Already, in fear of the effects of this measure, thousands of workmen are thrown out of employment and American productions enormously reduced. The measure as it now stands is revolutionary."

The senator adds: "It is a marvel that in a district so largely interested in varied employments there should be any doubt as to the result."

The district has always been Democratic, until it was carried by McKinley last time by a majority of 500.

Between Coxey and the Wilson bill, somebody makes lots of money on Wall street these days. The Democrats help the trust stocks out one day and Coxey sends them flying down the next.

The Portland Telegram says: "This is a year when there should be no room for the demagogue in politics. The situation is so serious that only practical, earnest men are needed."

Says the Standard-Union: "We need no other assurance that Mr. Cleveland is undisturbed in his mind than his letter to Black. He is threshing the same old bundle of straw. The solemn insip-

idity of what he says is characteristically gigantic."

The Astorian may have something to say further on about E. C. Lewis, the Democratic candidate for sheriff. His record as a public officer is made.
