MR. BROWNE IS IN EARNEST He Deposits \$5,000 With the Lawyers Ful ton to Clear Off Existing Liens.

Late last evening it was learned that the first eastern money Astoria has seen from a railroad source was a New York draft for \$5,000 given to the Fulton Brothers by Edward Browne yesterday to lift a judgment they held against the Astoria and Portland railroad.

Mr. Browne was hunted up, and in an interview stated that he would not go into specific details, but the finances are all arranged for back east, and that he is here to take up the Nehalem road and complete it, and expects to stay here until all the arrangements are made and work begun on the road.

ON EASY STREET. The Pacific Can Company, of this city, has made under a contract with the Zimmerman Can Opener Company to manufacture their patent can exclusively on the Pacific Coast.

Mr. Frank Kinsey, the vice president of the Zimmerman Company, spent a month here, with the head machinist, Mr. Nelson Troyer, perfecting the machine dies, as the patent is a new one, and the Pacific people are the first to introduce them on the tops of salmon cans.

It must be a good thing, for the Astoria factory have already received orders for over 2,000,000 cans that have the patent attachment, and these cans cost \$2.50 more on a thousand than the ordinary cans. Now, if the Pacific pay Mr. Kinsey's company a royalty of \$1 on each 1,000, why his company is strictly in it, for at that rate on the orders mentioned the royalties would amount to \$25,000.
