THE BITER BITTEN.

The Democrats in congress are in a state of phreny bordering on distraction over the fix they find themselves in with the tariff bill. They thought to show their contempt for the Republicans, and at the same deprive them of their constitutional right to a fair and free discussion and amendment of the bill, by securing a secret agreement among themselves on the bill before it was reported to the senate, and then by watching their chance force a premature passage of the measure by some such parliamentary trick as was played with the seigniorage bill, and thus enjoy with keen relish the helpless rage of the Republicans at the trickery and injustice put upon them by this violation of all precedent and the decency of ordinary parliamentary practice.

They have, however, been caught by their own trap. The laugh is upon them, and right richly have they deserved the utter humiliation and disgrace of their position. Scandal and dissension have followed them all the way through their nefarious scheme, and some of their leaders can never hope to live down the infamy of the repeated lies they have been forced to tell on the floor of the senate, to say nothing of the charges of corruption and dishonesty which have been freely whispered around the hotels and drawing rooms of Washington.

only enact such marginal legislation as is left after their own pocket books are satisfied? The McKinley bill or the Wilson bill is not the important issue at present. The vital question at stake is the presence of this almost intangible and unobserved gang of bribers, whose work is seen by its effects.

The tariff is a matter of policy, and its settlement seems to be as far off as ever; the lobby is a matter of the life or death of this alleged government for the people, and its settlement cannot be postponed. The Messrs. Browne, of New York City, who are in Astoria for the purpose of making arrangements for the immediate resumption of work on the Nehalem branch railway, have the appearance of being very much in earnest, and it is the opinion of leading business men, in a position to know, that they have all the evidence necessary to establish their financial backing and ability to carry out any contract made with them.

Every day or two there is a shower of telegrams from Washington that the Democracy are agreed about a tariff bill. This does well until some one calls for particulars. Then no one can tell whether the reform is for revenue or deficiency—for an income tax or a sugar tax. The destitution of the Democratic party when business principles are concerned must now be apparent to every man with a grain of sense.

There seems to be at least one bona fide proposition now pending before the subsidy committee, and without intending any reflection or criticism on anybody, it may be said that the people are laboring under a great deal of suspense about the railroad matter, and have a right to expect some tangible development without much further delay.

There are good consistent Democrats all over the state of Oregon who intend to vote for Republican candidates for senator and representatives, out of sheer concern for what will inevitably happen if the Republicans fail to have a good safe majority on joint ballot in the next legislature.

It is a leading topic of gossip in Washington that certain Democratic senators are making immense fortunes on the fluctuations of the stock market, due to the uncertainty and conflicting statements about the tariff bill.

The prediction may be safely ventured that as between Col. Breckenridge and the best Republican that could be opposed to him, Breckenridge will be returned to congress by the normal Democratic majority.

The Astorian does not object to the publication in the Portland and Sound papers of anything they see fit to clip from its columns, but there are serious objections to their omission to give the proper credit.

There are strong reasons why the approaching election will be the most important ever held in Oregon, and every Republican taxpayer of Clatsop county is under obligations to vote and work for the election of the candidates for senator and representative on his ticket.
