# **NewOrdinanceWanted**

AS FOLLOWS:

Be it ordained by dealers in clothing, and railroaded through in one night and have the mayor sign it the same night, so when you wake up in the morning you find a brand new law, that no man shall have the right to go to any other place to purchase goods without paying at least 40 per cent more than is sold at the Consignee Sale, corner West Ninth and Third streets. And be it further enacted that if a fisherman don't buy an oil suit or rubber coat for \$5 per cent less than is charged elsewhere in the city, he shall have the right to bring S. Friedman, manager of the consignee store before the police judge and be fined \$400 for each offense, or be imprisoned in the city tall and fed on salmon heads and water, or both fine and imprisonment. And be it further enacted that no other person shall be hereafter allowed to come to this city and engage in any occupation that will conflict with S. Friedman, and if any person who shall dare to come here, shall be fined \$400 and be ordered out of the city limits.
