## MARINE NOTES.

The British ship Barrowdale is on her way out from England to Vancouver.

The steamer R. P. Elmore will be brought in today in tow of the Truckee.

The steamer Danube arrived in about 6 o'clock yesterday morning, and left for Portland about five hours later.

The City of Kingston, which has been in the hands of the painters and carpenters for some time, is out again in the Sound service.

The British admiralty will pay in subsidies this year to the Cunard, White Star, Peninsula, Oriental and Canadian Pacific companies the sum of about \$170,000 each.

It costs Great Britain \$20,000 to scrape the barnacles off the bottom of one of its big men-of-war and repaint it. This has to be done twice a year in the case of nearly every vessel.

The steamer Roselle, which started from San Francisco for the Sound Tuesday to go into competition for the Alaska business, has been forced back to the home port by an accident to her machinery.

It is reported that if Seattle succeeds in running a line of steam schooners to Central America, thus diverting the trade of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, the latter will meet the opposition with a big cut.—Telegraph.

Yesterday morning the Oriental steamship Victoria sailed for Yokohama and Hongkong. She had on board 2,000 tons of flour, a large amount of coal, a cargo of condensed milk and a large number of pseudo Chinese merchants. Two Chinese ordered deported from here were among the passengers.—Telegraph.

## ORDINANCE NO. 1889.

(As Amended.)  
An Ordinance to Change the Names of Certain Streets Within the City of Astoria.

The City of Astoria does ordain as follows: Section 1. The streets within the City of Astoria running east and west, or in an easterly or westerly direction, and hereinafter called as they have heretofore been known and designated, shall be, and they are, hereby changed in name as follows: Concomly street, in McClure's, and First street, in Adair's, to Astor street; Chananus street, in McClure's, and Second street, in Adair's, to Bond street; Squemoque street, in McClure's, and Third street, in Adair's, to Commercial street; Jefferson street, in McClure's, and King's Court street, in Shively's, and Fourth street, in Adair's, to Duane street.

Astor street, in McClure's, and Cedar street, in Shively's, to Exchange street; Court street, in McClure's, Wall street and Hemlock street, in Shively's, and Fifth street, in Adair's, to Franklin avenue.

Seventh street, in McClure's, Arch street and Pine street, in Shively's, and Sixth street, in Adair's, to Grand avenue.

Eighth street, in McClure's; Wing street, in Shively's, and Seventh street, in Adair's, to Harrison avenue.

Ninth street, in McClure's; Spruce street and Tullip street, in Shively's, and Eighth street, in Adair's, to Irving avenue.

Tenth street, in McClure's, and Berry street, in Shively's, to Jerome avenue.

Eleventh street, in McClure's; Fir street, in Shively's, and Powers avenue, in Adair's, to Kensington avenue.

Twelfth street, in McClure's, and Alder street, in Shively's, to Lexington avenue.

Thirteenth street, in McClure's, South street and Charter street, in Shively's, to Madison avenue.

Summit avenue, in McClure's, and Summit street, in Shively's, to Niagara avenue.

Section 2. The streets within the City of Astoria running north and south, or in a northerly or southerly direction, and hereinafter called as they have heretofore been known and designated, shall be, and they are, hereby changed in name as follows:

McClure street, in McClure's, to First street.

Section 3. Said streets and avenues shall hereafter be known and designated by the above or changed names, and not otherwise.

Section 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.
