ON THE WATER QUESTION. Chairman Parker Makes a Statement. With much pleasure the Astorian presents its readers the following communication from the chairman of the water commission, and ventures to hope the same may prove an entirely satisfactory explanation to its numerous housekeeping correspondents.

Editor Astorian: Answer the "Water Question," again and again, and in answer to the inquiries of "Indignant," "Exasperated" and other housekeepers in Astoria, I will state that Supt. Smith, of the water works, has, probably, heretofore, kindly informed all housekeepers who are anxious to have a good supply of good hydrant water on hand at 4 o'clock a. m., or at all hours of day and night, that if they (men or women) will put up a small special tank that will contain from 50 to 100 gallons, near their kitchen or bathroom, connected with the waterworks' pipes, he will see that such tanks are kept suitably filled every day with the best and purest water for domestic use in all Oregon.
