

A BOVINE INCIDENT.

The following communication explains itself:

Editor Astorian—

A cow belonging to a widow lady, living on Court and Cass streets, was finding her way home from the range among the hills, and the eagle eye of the poundmaster fell upon her, and she was "run in." No such violation of the city's laws could be tolerated for a minute. The fine, I am told, for such violation is \$5. Some friends interfered in the lady's behalf, and the poundmaster magnanimously cut it down to \$2.50.

Now this cow was quietly minding her own business, wending her way home after a successful day's grazing among Astoria's seven hills. It does not appear that she intended coming down town; indeed, there was nothing to call her down town, unless it was to learn the latest railroad news, and as she seemed to have all she needed, it is doubtful if she would have come down even for that. I have heard it asked, "Why was this widow's cow pulled and run in for walking on the grass, when the violation of so many important laws goes unpunished in the city?" One answered: "It was to get the \$5." Another was mean enough to insinuate that the laws of the city were allowed to be violated, for the same reason. But I hardly believe that. But I do find a feeling among the people that all should be served alike in such matters.

If the variety theatres and the merry-go-rounds are to run on Sunday and Sunday nights, and make the town a bedlam with their bacchanalian yells, and keep the people awake half the night, let the cow run on the grass that she may yield milk for the hungry. If the gambling tables are to run unmolested, contrary to law, "why cause a poor helpless widow to run all over town to find her only means of support in the cow lockup, for no other offense than doing her duty in going home unattended, and for which the poor widow had to pay \$2.50 out of her meal tub to extricate? If the cow had been the merry-go-rounds last Sunday night, and had been arrested for disorderly conduct, no one would have thought of defending her. But there was not the slightest danger of that, as cows never do such things. The people are curious to know why all are not served alike. Would it not be just?

ORDINANCE NO. 1889.

(As Amended.)

An Ordinance to Change the Names of Certain Streets Within the City of Astoria.

The City of Astoria does ordain as follows:

Section 1. The streets within the City of Astoria running east and west, or in an easterly or westerly direction, and hereinafter called as they have heretofore been known and designated, shall be, and they are, hereby changed in name as follows: Concomly street, in McClure's, and First street, in Adair's, to Astor street. Chenamus street, in McClure's, and Second street, in Adair's, to Bond street. Squemoque street, in McClure's, and Water street, in Shively's, and Third street, in Adair's, to Commercial street. Jefferson street, in McClure's; Cushman's Court street, in Shively's, and Fourth street, in Adair's, to Duane street.

Astor street, in McClure's, and Cedar street, in Shively's, to Exchange street. Court street, in McClure's, Wall street, and Hemlock street, in Shively's, and Fifth street, in Adair's, to Franklin street.

Seventh street, in McClure's; Arch street and Pine street, in Shively's, and Sixth street, in Adair's, to Grand avenue.

Eighth street, in McClure's; Wing street, in Shively's, and Seventh street, in Adair's, to Harrison avenue.

Ninth street, in McClure's; Spruce street and Tullip street, in Shively's, and Eighth street, in Adair's, to Irving avenue.

Tenth street, in McClure's, and Berry street, in Shively's, to Jerome avenue.

Eleventh street, in McClure's; Fir street, in Shively's, and Powers avenue, in Adair's, to Kensington avenue.

Twelfth street, in McClure's, and Alder street, in Shively's, to Lexington avenue.

Thirteenth street, in McClure's; South street and Charter street, in Shively's, to Madison avenue.

Summit avenue, in McClure's, and Summit avenue, in Shively's, to Niagara avenue.

Section 2. The streets within the City of Astoria running north and south, or in a northerly and southerly direction, and hereinafter called, as they have heretofore been known and designated, shall be, and they are, hereby changed in name as follows:

Section 3. Said streets and avenues shall hereafter be known and designated by the new or changed names, and not otherwise.

Section 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.

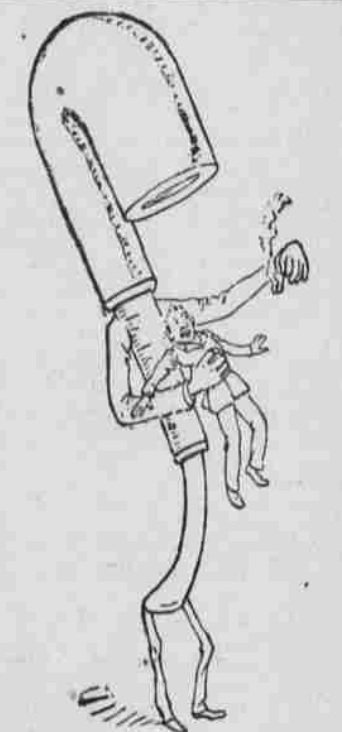
