NEXT MONDAY'S ISSUE.

It is reasonable to suppose the voters of Oregon have about made up their minds for whom they intend to vote next Monday, and it is to be hoped they realize that in the coming election, an perhaps never before to the same extent in the history of the state, the questions presented for their decision are purely those of party reputation and principle. The personality of candidates on the various tickets counts absolutely for nothing. There may be—indeed, it cannot be denied there are—men running on all the tickets who would disgrace any cause, and on the other hand, it is just as true that there are good and true men on each of the tickets. But the issue before the people of Oregon now is one that the good or bad qualities of no particular candidate can in anywise affect, and the man who allows his prejudice against any candidate to influence his vote in favor of a man on the opposing ticket, is untrue to himself and a traitor to the principles he proclaims and pretends to support. There may be times when the purification of the party or of politics generally demands a spirit of independence on the part of the voter. In fact, this disposition of independence, so often shown to advantage in the past, is the safeguard of republican institutions. These are not the times and this is not the year, however, when this propensity is to be encouraged. The material interests of every man, woman and child in this great commonwealth literally hang upon the success or defeat of one or the other of the main political parties now battling for supremacy in the state. The emergency is too serious to talk now about rebuking ring rule, the turning down of unworthy men, or for the venting of spite or spleen against candidates on the ticket. All this will keep until another occasion. The thing to do now is to close up the ranks and down the common enemy, then after the fight is won and the peril passed these internal differences can be satisfactorily adjusted. Let the Republicans of Oregon face

the foes to their state's prosperity, like many of them did the enemies of the country in years ago, with unbroken columns and solid front; the petty rivalries and personal objections to commanders swallowed up in the dangers of the calamity threatening all.

There were thousands of men in this country who bitterly repented the way they had voted last fall two years ago, before that election was three months old. This should be a warning against taking any chances on next Monday's election. There is but one safe course for every man who has the best interests of the state at heart, be he Republican, Democrat or Populist, and that is to vote the Republican ticket straight.

The candidate for county assessor on the Republican ticket, Mr. Alfred Gibbons, is by many odds the best qualified man in the race for that office. It will show good sense and be money in the pockets of Clatsop county voters to elect him.

The exposure of Pennoyer's connection with the lumber trust, as shown up in yesterday's Oregonian, is the strongest blow the governor has received during the campaign.

POLITICAL POINTERS FOR OREGON VOTERS.

Senator Voorhees (Speech October 5, 1881).
 "The policy of a free and unrestricted exchange and sale of commodities between commercial countries has, for the last fifty years especially, been the theme of eulogy on the part of British writers and statesmen, but it cannot be forgotten that this policy was never advanced on the part of Great Britain, until by hundreds of years of not merely protective but prohibitory legislation, she had so fostered and built up her home industries, and at the same time so cheapened the wages of labor that competition on the part of other nations was no longer feared."

Richard A. Dana (New York Sun, 1891).
 "The full purpose and ultimate significance of the reciprocity program conceived by Mr. Blaine did not at first reveal themselves to the public mind. Even the commercial and industrial advantages derivable from such a policy were not instantly and clearly appreciated. Still less was the political significance of a scheme, the most capacious ever formed by an American statesman since Thomas Jefferson planned the purchase of Louisiana, at once distinctly recognized. Yet a little reflection must convince us that under the guidance of Secretary Blaine we have entered on a course whose fixed and by no means distant goal is the acquirement for the United States of not only commercial, but political ascendancy throughout the western hemisphere."

Mr. D. H. Mason (in the American Defender).
 "All the prosperity enjoyed by the American people—absolutely all the prosperity without any reservation whatever—from the foundation of the United States government down to the present time, has been under the reign of protective principles; and all the hard times suffered by the American people in the same period have been preceded, either by a heavy reduction of duties on imports (or by a threat of such reduction) or by insufficient protection; thus refuting all free trade theories on the subject."

Mr. Depew's Opinion, at a Dinner in New York (referring to the last National election).
 "It was the triumph of the liar in American politics. The liar collected a congress of more than two-thirds, of some honest Democrats and many phenomenal cranks, and when that congress shall have adjourned the American people will understand, in regard to the liar, that the deeds of men live after them; and while the liar will live as long as the race in its present degraded condition survives, he never more will be a factor in our politics."

THE IRRIGATION MOVEMENT.

Active preparations are now being made for the next National Irrigation Congress to be held about September 15, at some point in the west not yet determined on. The last congress, which was in session an entire week in Los Angeles, October, 1893, appointed commissioners in every western state and territory, whose duty it is to prepare a report to be submitted to the coming congress covering all the features of special interest in each state and territory of the arid west. These reports will show the amount of arid and semi-arid land; the amount of land now irrigated; and the acreage believed to be irrigable; the sources of water supply, developed and possible of development; the cost of procuring, storing and delivering water on lands; state legislation, in force and needed; national legislation as to the disposition of arid lands and government control of water sources; and such other points as may suggest themselves to each commission as being pertinent to their own state.

The commission for Oregon is composed of F. H. Brigham, chairman, Pendleton; E. H. Test, Vale; Charles S. Moore, Klamath Falls; S. Rothchild, Pendleton; J. M. Huntington, The Dalles.

The citizens of Oregon are cordially invited to correspond with any of these gentlemen, and give them such information as they may possess on the points to be covered by their report, as it is designed to cover every point of interest which can be suggested. Information covering the work of the national committee can be obtained from Fred. L. Alles, Secretary, Los Angeles, Cal., and information as to the work in Oregon from any of the commissioners named above.

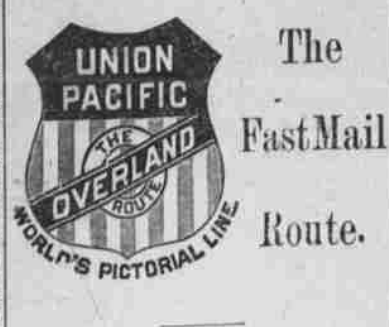
