THE COUNCIL MEETING.

No business of any importance was transacted at Tuesday evening's council meeting, there being no communications of any character.

A paper on the preservation of the salmon industry was read by the mayor, and referred to a committee composed of Councilmen Barker, Young and Langworthy.

The following claims were reported and allowed: C. E. Foster, \$3.50; Freeman & Bremner, \$35.25; Fred. Salk, \$3; Dalgely Iron Works, \$2.50; J. R. Clinton, \$12; Clatsop Mill Co., \$144 and \$146; R. R. Marton, \$150; Astoria Box Co., \$14.69; Foard & Stokes, \$2.75; Oregon Improvement Co., \$5; Griffin & Reed, \$5.50; J. S. Dellinger, \$72; Joe Pety, \$10; Astoria Wood Yard, \$5.75; Mrs. T. O'Brien, \$19.21 and \$18.63.

The following petitions were read and referred to the appropriate committees: From the Astoria District Messenger and Electric Co., asking a franchise to run a telephone system, was read and referred to the committees on ways and means.

From residents of Upper Astoria, asking the council to change the existing cow ordinance, was read and referred to the street committee.

The committee on fire and water, on the communication from the board of delegates of the A. F. D., asking the council to purchase exempt certificates at a cost of \$62, recommended that the certificates be not purchased at the expense of the city.

The ordinance providing for the issuance of \$20,000 of municipal bonds for general purposes was read the third time and duly passed.

Auditor Osburn states that the meeting was the shortest, and most unimportant, with the exception of Mayor Kinney's excellent paper, since he has been connected with the city government.
