The Two Lost Fishermen Picked Up At Sea.

Mr. John Fox received a letter yesterday, from a well known citizen of New Port, conveying the welcome news that the two fishermen carried over the bar some days ago had been picked up at sea, from the bottom of their capsized boat, by the steamer "Bavarril," on the evening of the 19th inst., and safely landed at the Cove Foulweather light house.
