SALMON HATCHERY.

Dr. H. M. Smith, secretary, and laboratory expert of the United States fish commissioner, has been in the city for several days in consultation with our cannery men regarding the condition of the fisheries, and collecting valuable statistics pertaining to the decline of the salmon industry.

From all the information that could be obtained, Dr. Smith favored the establishing of one or more hatcheries, to the combined capacity of 50,000,000 fry. He pointed out to those interested the absolute necessity of a stringent weekly close law, in order that a sufficient number of salmon may reach the spawning grounds.
