THE SALMON QUESTION.

It is to be hoped there will be no unnecessary delay on the part of the council in acting upon Mayor Kinney's salmon message. After the adoption of the proposed resolution, the mayor will be in a position to communicate with the public authorities of each town in Washington and Oregon in any way interested in the preservation of the salmon fisheries, and their co-operation can be secured without difficulty in some form of united action. There is no subject of greater importance to all Columbia river people than that of fostering the salmon industry, and no time should be wasted in the effort to determine the kind of legislation needed, and whether this can best be furnished by the state assemblies or the national congress. If it is decided that the general government has jurisdiction in the premises, there is especial need for haste in the matter. As has been suggested by The Astorian, it is very doubtful if the present session of congress will last longer than the middle of July, but before that time the question of jurisdiction could be settled, and a special committee of investigation appointed. The work of collating the necessary data and statistics to lay before the committee might be attended to more leisurely, but every preparation should be made to aid and facilitate the work of that body long before the time of its arrival here. On the other hand, if it is decided that the desired regulations should be the subject of state legislation, then some method must be devised to insure uniformity in the laws adopted. It is said there are no less than fifty good newspapers published in the towns and villages more or less concerned in salmon industries, and these papers will all quickly take up the movement if it can only be started. It should be remembered that Mayor Kinney's suggestion only goes to the investigation of the question of what kind of protection is most needed, and whether that is the subject of state or national legislation. There can be no room for suspicion as to the good faith of such a general inquiry, and every one who so desires can have ample opportunity to be heard before any conclusion is reached in the matter.

Business men know as well as any men on the face of the earth what the credit of the nation means, says R. G. Horr. They are the last men in the world who would make any attempt to destroy the credit of this nation. Why does any one imagine that they are anxious to have an increase in the bonded debt of the United States. They have done everything in their power during the last twenty-five years to reduce the national debt.

No people on the face of the earth understand better that a nation is prosperous when it is getting out of debt, and not when it is getting into debt, and the business of no men on the face of the earth is more affected by the improper management of financial matters in this country than these same men whom the Populists are constantly abusing.

This mistake would not be so often made if the members of the Populist party could come to understand that men save a competency in this world, and do it honestly. Prosperous men, who accumulate a competency, are by no means all of them scoundrels. A man may be a good business man and not be a thief. A man of large means may be a patriot and a decent citizen as readily as one who is poor.

If these modern financiers could once

learn that a man can be worth a good deal of property in the world without being a robber and a scoundrel, it would save them from a great deal of abuse which they are constantly heaping upon men who are really the men who do so much toward building up the best interests of this nation.

What the nation today needs is more business, more activity among men who have capital and more employment for men who live by their day's wages.

We are suffering more today on account of the rant and rustian of demagogues than from a scarcity of a circulating medium. The old-fashioned method of getting ahead in the world by industry, economy and good business sense has not yet become extinct. Noise, blab, can never take the place of honest labor in the economics of the world. It is well for the human race that such is the case.
