WHERE ARE THEY?

There are from \$6000 to \$30,000 picked right up out of the river every night during the fishing season. This amount of money is tributary to Astoria and yet even though it is known that there are less salmon packed than ten years ago, there were absent from the chamber of commerce meeting last night men who above all others should have been there to have given the recommendations of the committee on the salmon hatchery proposition their whole support. Take the salmon industry away from Astoria and what would become of it? What would the property of the Flavels, the Shiveleys, the Taylors, the Meglers, and others be worth? How much trade would Foard & Stokes and other prominent merchants have compared with what they have now? Yet none of these gentlemen seemed to think enough of the object of the meeting to attend it.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

At a regular meeting of the Chamber of Commerce last night the report of the committee on the preservation of the salmon industry was received, but being incomplete in some particulars, was withdrawn by the committee for revision. The report will be published in full by the Astorian as soon as completed and filed.

COUNTY COURT.

The regular session of the county court met yesterday at 9 a. m. Mr. R. M. Wooden being the only member of the old board present, called the court to order and C. J. Trenchard, county clerk, read the oath of office which had been filed, and called Judge J. H. D. Gray to the chair to preside. Upon taking his seat Judge Gray called for the oath of Commissioner Peterson, which was read, and Mr. Peterson took his seat in the board. The bonds of F. I. Dunbar, county clerk, J. W. Hare, sheriff, C. S. Gundersen, recorder, H. L. Ward, treasurer, R. Harry, surveyor, Wm. Pohl, coroner, J. Abercrombie, were read, approved, and filed. After a short address by Judge Gray the board proceeded to the regular business. Financial report of clerk laid over for further examination. Appointment H. J. Wherrity and T. J. Boelling as deputies to clerk, Richard Prael, deputy sheriff, and H. P. Drennan, as jailor, approved. Reports of H. S. Lyman, school superintendent, and Martin Foard, treasurer, read and placed on file. Communication of H. S. Lyman, regarding collection of delinquent taxes, read and placed on file. Petition from M. Buchanan and others, asking for a new road district in the southwestern part of the county, read and allowed. The new district will be known as District No. 14. M. Buchanan was appointed supervisor. Ordered that probate matters be heard on Wednesday, after first day of every term. Petitions signed by forty-five or more voters for liquor license for three months in the Seaside precinct of C. A. McGulre, R. L. Eberman, and Alex Gilbert, read; also an illegal remonstrance signed

by thirty-five voters. After due consideration the licenses were granted. Communications from E. M. Grimes, regarding bridge across the Necanicum, referred to district attorney. Communication from Interstate Fair Association, referred to Chamber of Commerce. Resignation of N. C. Hilleary, supervisor of Road District No. 7, accepted subject to examination of accounts. A. B. McMullan appointed to fill vacancy. Petition of C. A. Bottom and others for bridge across Walker's creek; referred to R. M. Wooden to ascertain best location, etc. Petition of Charles Miller, asking for \$75 for bridge in District No. 12, referred to R. M. Wooden for best location. Ordered that M. Foard, retired treasurer, be instructed to turn over all monies and property in his possession belonging to the county, to E. L. Ward, treasurer. Communication from J. W. Fisher, keeper of Walluski bridge, allowed and salary fixed at \$30 per month. Communication to Martin Foard from state treasurer was read. Ordered that the clerk write him to furnish an itemized statement of state's claim for delinquent taxes of Clatsop county. Andrew Bue was appointed janitor at \$20 a month. Ordered that the overseer of the poor be instructed to make a report in regard to the condition of persons receiving aid from the county, and that the allowances be continued as in the past. There are now eight on the roll. The salaries of deputy county officers were fixed as follows per month: H. J. Wherrity, deputy clerk, \$110; T. G. Boelling, deputy clerk, \$75; R. G. Prael, deputy sheriff, \$110; H. P. Drennan, deputy sheriff, \$75. Court adjourned until 10 o'clock today.
