Lieut. O. E. Wood, of the detachment of United States artillery now stationed at Fort Canby, was in town on business connected with the post yesterday. The lieutenant is a polished and most agreeable gentleman, and evidently belongs to the old school of officers. He is well pleased with his location at Canby, and pronounces our country at this season of the year one of the most delightful he ever lived in.

The Court Street cases have been decided and the mandate of the supreme court entered adversely to the city. This involves a loss to the city of \$1,500 on Court, Genevieve and West Ninth streets, and was occasioned by the vacancy in the office of mayor at the time the ordinances providing for the improvement of these streets was passed. It was held that the president of the council was not authorized to approve ordinances, but in other respects the proceedings were regular.
