The Canadian Pacific road has trains now running to and from Vancouver on time without transfer.
There is nothing like a good example. The Ross, Higgins & Co. store is being repainted in a Hotel Occident.
At Trullinger's mill they are changing one of the fly wheels; also some of the machinery in the electric light plant.
Government Inspector Jacobs is expected in the city today, to pass on the work completed at the custom house.

THE FLAVEL CASE AFFIRMED.

The supreme court handed down a decision yesterday affirming the famous case of Raymond vs. Flavel, decided by the lower court, in favor of the defendant some time ago. This case, it will be recalled, involves the title to a large tract of land, now included within the limits of the city of Flavel; and the opinion of the supreme court confirms the title of the Flavel estate, which was attacked by the plaintiff, Raymond. Mr. C. W. Fulton represented the Flavel heirs, and both he and his clients are to be congratulated on the favorable termination of the case.

COMMON COUNCIL.

An adjourned meeting of the city council was held last night, Bergman, Langworthy, and Scherneckau being the only absentees. Megfer and Wright's petition, accompanied with a check for \$400, for a liquor license, was granted. Petition for the improvement of Fifteenth street was referred to the street committee.
The petition of Max Strahl to have the \$400 auctioneer's license fee repealed, was referred to the ways and means committee.
B. R. Smith was awarded the contract for the Fifth street sewer, he being the lowest bidder.
The committee appointed on the late message of Mayor Kinney regarding the protection of the salmon industry made their report, as published in full in the Astorian last week.
Mr. Lewis offered an amendment that the last clause be stricken out and the following amendment inserted:
"We are of the opinion that the laws regarding the closed seasons and the weekly close time are generally observed, but that the principal causes of the rapid decrease of the run of salmon are the fish wheels, fish traps, and other small mesh gear used in the fishing business, and that we should apply to the legislature of the state for relief against these destructive agencies, as soon as it is held, and also to the general government for such relief as lies in their power to grant."
After some discussion the report was adopted as amended.
A petition for the removal of the burned salmon at the Astoria Packing Co. was referred to the chief of police with power to act.
A resolution petitioning congress to add an appropriation to the pending sundry appropriation bill of a sum of money sufficient to establish on the Columbia or tributaries a hatchery of not less than 100,000,000 fry per year was adopted and the council then adjourned.
