

SCHUBERT CLUB.

The concert at the Methodist Church a Great Success.

The concert at the Methodist Church on the evening of July 4th marks a new era in concerts to the music loving people of Astoria. While we have long been noted on the Northwest Coast for the number and excellence of our local singers, there has never been such a choice entertainment of a musical character here before. All the selections were of a high order, and beautifully interpreted.

Astoria is to be congratulated on possessing so fine a musical society as the Schubert Club, which, though, of recent organization, has already proved its object to be thorough, earnest, systematic work.

The club quartet displayed in their singing wonderful harmony of voices usually obtained only by long practice. The dainty, tripping measures of the Spring Song, and the deeper tones of the "Good Night" song, were well calculated to show their good range of voice. The latter song gave to the tenor and bass well-improved opportunity for short but effectively rendered solos.

Mrs. Crosby, under whose skillful leadership the Schubert Club is making so great progress, sang most acceptably "The Dream," and responded to an encore with a charming Scotch ballad, "Loch Lomond." Her voice is equally powerful and rich in the tenor and contralto notes.

Mrs. Danziger, the soprano, sang with more than her usual sweetness and expression.

To Mrs. Olson's piano solos as well as her taste as an accompanist, too much praise cannot be given. Her quiet, unassuming manner adds greatly to the charm of her very brilliant execution.

It is not often that Astoria people can listen at home to so thorough artists as Herr Arnold and Herr Turney.

To the lovers of the violin the delightful tones of the unusually fine instrument in the skillful hands of Herr Arnold must have been full of pleasant suggestions and memories. This violin, made in 1730, by Gaurielius, was for a time in the museum at Copenhagen, and has been in the family of its present owner over sixty years. It is now evidently the friend and companion of the talented musician who drew from it those entrancing tones.

We are sure those who listened to the music of the evening will need no urging to attend another concert under the auspices of the Schubert Club.

The attendance was large considering the many counter attractions, and the audience was to a noticeable degree an appreciative and inspiring one.
