## SCALE THE WAGES.

The recent strike, with its mob violence, loss of life and business disturbance, makes it apparent that some way must be found to prevent such calamities, and naturally every one turns to arbitration—voluntary, if possible, compulsory if necessary.

Compulsory arbitration could not be enforced against irresponsible persons unless an imprisonment penalty were provided, nor would it prove satisfactory to either employer or employed, except when rigid investigation was made into details, and the commission composed of men above suspicion or reproach.

The responsibility of deciding a controversy and enforcing a verdict that would work hardship to hundreds of wage earners, or, perhaps destroy a valuable industry, is greater than most conscientious men would like to assume, and in framing a compulsory arbitration law it must be remembered that it may also be used as an instrument of persecution.

Voluntary arbitration is a correct method of settling labor troubles, because an agreement to arbitrate shows a disposition on both sides to make concessions, and when employed generally results in a peaceful solution of the controversy. But employers are not always willing to arbitrate labor differences, and for that reason voluntary arbitration is sometimes impracticable.

The right way to prevent strikes and preserve harmonious relations between employer and employed is to contract for fixed wages for the various classes of employees. This system is now employed by various labor unions with successful results and should be adopted in every industry throughout the country.

When the scale of wage prices is fixed for a certain period in advance employers know how to make contracts with customers, for the labor cost of their products is unchangeable. It also satisfies wage-earners that their position is secure, provided trade is prosperous and the business of their employer is properly managed. Nothing adds more to the stability and prosperity of a business enterprise than the certainty that no labor troubles will ensue, and that prices will remain unchanged.

The committee appointed by the Athletic Club to solicit subscriptions for the regatta, are meeting with success so far as they have canvassed, and it is hoped those of the citizens who have not yet been called upon will respond liberally when asked. The success of the regatta depends largely upon the efforts of the citizens, and if they desire to see the town filled up with people, they will join with the Athletic Association in making it a grand affair. Already the neighboring cities are taking notice of the event, and with judicious advertising we can start in this direction some of the best boats on the Columbia and the Sound. Nearly every one speaking of the regatta, predicts a grand success, and well they may, for not since the centennial have the good people of Astoria worked together so harmoniously as they are now doing. Pulling together means ultimate success in any undertaking.

The mongrel tariff bill proposes to do with American industries just what Debs tried to do with the railroads—tie them up, and thus render their profitable operation impossible. It is the creature of that grotesque type of

the condition of the workingman by destroying the market for his labor.

The announcement in yesterday's dispatches that prominent electricians promise us a universal light over all the earth, is a proposition that will not be received with favor by the summer girls at Clatsop and North Beaches.
