AROUND TOWN.

The steamer Columbine finished loading buoys and supplies at the station last evening and this morning will leave for Gray's Harbor, where she will work for the next two or three days.

The steam schooner Rival arrived in from San Francisco last evening, and after discharging a small amount of cargo at the A. S. Co.'s dock, proceeded up the river. She had her fore-topmast carried away in a recent gale.

Services as usual at the Presbyterian church. The pastor, Rev. Robert Liddell, being absent from the city, the Rev. Harris A. Webb, of Victoria, B. C., being on a visit to North Beach, has kindly consented to officiate for him morning and evening.

The British ship Cathcart, 37 days from Hogo, Japan, arrived in last night with 700 tons ballast. She had an uneventful voyage encountering considerable fog. Captain McChesney and crew were in perfect health during the trip. The Cathcart is a ship of 1387 tons.

Mr. George Uhler, national president of the Marine Engineers' Association, is expected in the city next Monday, to confer with the members of Association No. 70. Mr. Uhler is on his regular annual tour, and will be remembered as one of the notable visitors to this coast two years ago.

A. S. Reed received yesterday by express a pair of young Irish pheasants, which he has on exhibition at the store of Griffin & Reed, where they will remain for several days. They have excited much interest among the descendants of the "owid nod," as well as others who have called to see these gamey birds.

The reports that the steamer Mayflower would make a trip to Ilwaco tomorrow is a mistake. She will go to Olney, leaving at 6 o'clock in the morning on account of the state of the tide, and the fare for the round trip will be 50 cents. The run to Ilwaco will be made one week from tomorrow, August 12th. Due notice will be given of the leaving time.

When Mr. Arthur Bartholomew returned from the football match last night he received letters from England conveying the sad intelligence that his little three-year-old son, Robert Sydney, was dead. The boy was ill only a few hours, and the news was a very great shock to the father of the little fellow, who has the sympathy of everyone in his bereavement.

The Finnish Brotherhood met yesterday and came to the conclusion to not give a picnic on Sunday, August 12th, as before advertised; therefore the Scandinavian Benevolent Society will try to make arrangements to give their annual picnic on that date instead of Friday, the 19th, if arrangements can be made satisfactorily for transportation.

John H. Rutter, the ship builder, was injured yesterday afternoon while working on the big cradle at Alderbrook. A large piece of wood fell, striking him on the head and right side, breaking a rib and causing a severe scalp wound. Dr. J. A. Fulton attended the injured man, leaving him as comfortable as possible under the circumstances. Another man whose name could not be learned cut his leg badly with an ax.

Dr. Walker, assisted by Dr. Jansen, yesterday performed a very difficult operation by removing a malignant growth from the neck of a Chinaman, who was brought over from Sunshine, Washington, by Ark Woo. The operation was made very difficult on account of the unusual flow of blood, and the time occupied was two and one-half hours. The doctors say that while the operation was highly successful, the result cannot be ascertained for several days.

The trim little two-masted schooner Kate and Ann, which left San Francisco on the second of last January for a sailing cruise in Japanese waters, arrived in port yesterday with 685 skins

on board. Captain Chas. Lytjen, her owner, and crew of thirteen, are well and report a pleasant voyage on the trip across from the Japan coast. Three years ago the Kate and Ann was fitted out in this city by Foard and Stokes and Fisher Bros. for a sealing cruise in northern waters. She had had luck, however, and was finally sold to her present owner, since which time she has had better success. The schooner will probably remain here during the winter, refitting here for her next season's cruise.

Attorney Clifton R. Thomson has tied his bicycle up in its stall and placed enough oats in the bin to keep it alive until it returns from his trip to Clatsop Beach, for which point he left yesterday.
