August is not very newsworthy for dry goods talk to the ladies, but a chance has come to them that they should not miss. Car after car of dry goods was shipped to San Francisco from the East, that were delayed from six to eight weeks by the strike, and then car after car came in all at once and nearly swamped the wholesale dealers. This afforded an excellent opportunity for cash buyers to step in and buy for cash at lower prices than have ever been or are likely to be known. Shanahan Brothers were among those to take advantage of this opportunity, and the dry goods they have bought have arrived, been placed on the counters, and are going like hot cakes to those who know bargains when they see them.

The match game of football between the A. F. C. and the British ship Maxwell yesterday was an exceedingly good exhibition and was exciting throughout. It was won by the home team by a score of three to nothing, but it was anybody's victory from start to finish. The sailors played splendidly, and with a little practice would have given the local men a hard call. Captain Jenkins of the Maxwell, was kind enough to stay on board the ship in order to permit his first and second officers to be present at the game. This makes Astoria's fifth match game of the season, with a record of four to one lost, and a total score of eighteen goals against seven kicked by its opponents. Bartholomew, the captain of last year, has led the club to victory in the last two games.

About 8:20 yesterday morning when the Potter had reached a point opposite Columbia City, one of her cylinder heads was blown out, and the steamer totally disabled for the time being. The telephone was close behind when the accident happened, and upon a signal came alongside and the Potter's twenty-two passengers were transferred to that boat. Captain Sullivan expected to get another boat from Portland, so the mail was not transferred, but after the telephone had gone, it was discovered that no other boat could be secured. This morning the Thompson will arrive with the mail and passengers, and instead of returning as usual, will remain and take the excursion to Young's Bay bridge, leaving for Portland on the Potter's time in the evening. It will probably be three or four weeks before the Potter will be able to take her regular run on the river.

Yesterday Deputy United States Marshal H. A. Smith arrested Pedro Bendetti, charged with assault on the high seas. Bendetti was a sailor on the British bark Lorton, which arrived in port on Friday afternoon, and the assault referred to was committed on the morning of the day previous, just off the Columbia river bar. It seems that the men were preparing to take the anchor out of the forecastle head and the mate ordered Bendetti to take the line to the winch. The latter said it was not necessary, and upon the mate's ordering him to obey his command, the man drew a long knife from his sheath and threatened the officer, who was standing on top of the forecastle. The mate at once descended toward the mutinous sailor, who quickly but suddenly sheathed his knife. No sooner had the mate got within reaching distance, however, than the sailor hauled off and landed a big, brawny fist against his face, cutting his lip badly. Upon reaching this port, the mate swore to a complaint, and had the man arrested. Marshal Smith will go up the river with his prisoner today.
