just been received here of the death

on the Colville Indian reservation, where

he had gone on a hunting trip, of Ranal

McDonald, one of the noted charac-

ters of the Northwest. He was a son

of Archibald McDonald, who founded

Astoria for the Astor Fur Company.

His mother was a daughter of old Chief

Concomly, of the Columbia River indi-

ians, with whom McDonald had formed

a treaty. When young Ranal reached

school age he was sent to Winnipeg

and educated. Returning to the coast,

he embarked on a trading vessel, and

was wrecked on the coast of Japan.

He was taken prisoner, and for years

was a servant of the Mikado. His

mother died when he was a boy, and he

was brought up by his grandfather.
