MONEY ENOUGH.

The cry that there is not money enough in circulation, that times would be better if we were to increase the volume to \$50 per capita or some other sum, has become very familiar. Suppose that the men who have become impressed by it were to look at what has happened in other countries. Here for instance, is an extract from the last message of the Argentine Republic which it will pay them to read:

It is asserted that the paper in circulation is becoming scarce, and from this the inference is drawn that more of it should be issued, without taking into account the fact that the void in the circulation proceeds from a want of confidence and not a want of money. A new issue would be a new cause for distrust, and would only increase the evil. It is really astonishing that such notions should still have enthusiastic advocates. It seems that the errors of the past and the experience acquired are a dead letter for those who suffer from them, and who still suffer from the effects of the crisis.

This shows how like the virus of the rattlesnake is the poison of the cheap money idea when once it has got into the blood. So the people of Argentine think their paper is becoming "scarce," and they want another infusion to revive waning prosperity! Well, at last accounts there were only something like \$200 to \$300 per capita in circulation. Nobody knows the exact amount, because they lost track of it in the vast stream of worthless cedulas, local bank bills, and government paper that has been flowing for years past. There is probably no spot on the surface of the earth where the money volume is as great in proportion to population and business as it is in the Argentine Republic. As a result of it, the country is burdened with an enormous debt that it can never pay, every industry is ruined, and the people are raising wheat and selling it at 37 cents to pay their interest to England. We ourselves have a little interest in that Argentine business. And that is the country where they still say that paper money is "scarce." The paper money delusion is well named an "insanity," it is often of the incurable kind.

General Ely S. Parker, who served with distinction on the staff of General Grant, during the war, is reported to be seriously ill at Fairfield, Conn. He is a lineal descendant of the famous Indian chief, Red Jacket, and is the last surviving chief of the Seneca tribe of the Six Nations.

THE PARTICULAR SERVICE OF OLOVER WENDELL HOLMES.

John W. Chadwick in the November Forum.

Whittier did much more than Holmes to soften the Puritan theology, but Holmes did vastly more than Whittier to soften the Puritan temper of the community. And here was his most characteristic work. He was neither stoic nor ascetic; neither indifferent to life's pleasant things, nor, while hankering for their possession, did he repress his noble rage and freeze the genial currents of his soul. His was "an undisguised enjoyment of earthly comforts"; a happy confidence in the excellence and glory of the present life; a persuasion, as one has said, that "if God made us, then he also meant us"; and he held to these things so earnestly, so pleasantly, so cheerily, that he could not help communicating them to everything he wrote. Many entered into his labors, and some, no doubt, did more than he to save what was best of the Puritan conscience while softening what was worst in the Puritan temper and what was most terrible in the Puritan theology. But it does not appear that any one else did so much as Mr. Holmes to change the social temper of New England, to make it less harsh and joyless, and to make easy for his fellow-countrymen the transition from the old things to the new. And it may be that there was the secret, in good part, of that great and steadily increasing affection which went out to him in later years, and which was the cause of his death.

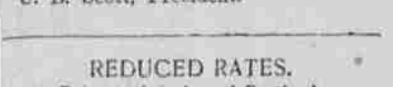

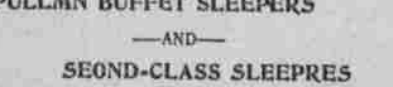
