## BOTH CLAIM A VICTORY

Budd and Estee Are Each Certain of an Election.

CONGRESSMAN BRYAN RETIRES.

The Cherokee Legislature Makes it Death to Sell Property to a Non-Resident.

Associated Press. San Francisco, Nov. 9.—At the state headquarters of each party a gubernatorial victory is claimed. The Republican chairman, P. B. Cornwall, has returns from every county from which he claims a minimum plurality for Estee of from 200 to 500, and thinks this vote will be increased. Estee himself expressed confidence in his election, and expects a plurality of 900 to 1200. Cornwall claims that Estee has been defrauded of thousands of votes in San Francisco by the Democratic judges and inspectors whom he believes counted for Budd votes cast for Estee. If the final returns do not show a plurality for Estee, the Republicans will demand a recount before the next legislature, where gubernatorial contested elections must be heard. This, it is claimed, will show such gains for Estee in San Francisco as will overcome a Democratic plurality of 1,000, should Budd secure such. John Markley, of the Democratic state committee, claims a plurality for Budd tonight of 2,018.

Budd on the Decline. His Plurality Being Steadily Cut Down.

San Francisco, Nov. 9.—At 7:30 p. m. complete returns from 40 precincts in Riverside county just received, reduced Budd's plurality to 683, with 238 returns in the state to bear from.

A LONG SERVICE. Admiral Gherardi to be Retired from Service Today.

Washington, Nov. 9.—Tomorrow at noon there will be placed on the retired list the commandant of the New York navy yard, Admiral Gherardi, one of the few war commanders now in the naval service, and known in naval parlance as a "sea-going admiral." His total active service amounts to 43 years and five months, and 25 years and eight months of that service were spent at sea. As a result of his retirement, Admiral Greer, at present president of the lighthouse board, becomes senior admiral of the navy. Commodore Sicard becomes a commandant at New York, and the following promotions will follow: Commodore C. C. Carpenter to be admiral; Capt. Rusp. R. Wallace to be commodore; Commander W. C. Wise to be captain; Lieutenant-Commander R. M. Berry to be commander; Lieutenant W. H. Everett to be lieutenant-commander; Lieutenant Junior Grade E. Craven to lieutenant; and Ensign John N. Elliott to be lieutenant junior grade.

WORDEN CONVICTED. The Train Wrecker Found Guilty of Murder in the First Degree.

Woodland, Cal., Nov. 9.—Salter D. Worden, one of the several A. R. U. men charged with having wrecked the Southern Pacific train during the strike in July last, causing the death of Engineer Clark and four United States soldiers, was today convicted of murder in the first degree. The jury offered no recommendation. The penalty is death or life imprisonment. The other accused train wreckers will be promptly tried.

REPORTED FROM WASHINGTON.

Washington, Nov. 9.—R. H. Carothers, chairman of the Kentucky Republican state committee, telegraphs Mr. Babcock that six Republicans have been elected to congress from that state without counting Denny, in the Ashland district.

Chairman Charles Caine, of Utah, wires that Cannon, Republican, is elected to congress, and unless the Republicans are counted out, they will control the constitutional convention.

Chairman T. B. Cornwall, of California, says the Republicans have elected six congressmen and Maguire is the only Democrat elected. The Republicans will control both branches of the legislature, but Estee is defeated by about 1500.

JONES OF NEVADA.

San Francisco, Nov. 9.—Complete returns from seventy out of 161 precincts in Nevada, give Jones, deliver, for governor) 523 plurality; Congressman Newlands (silver) 98.

POPULIST GAINS IN TEXAS.

Austin, Tex., Nov. 9.—Returns from

the state show large Populist gains, but Culbertson, Democrat, for governor, will have a plurality of about 40,000. In the Twelfth congressional district, Noonan, Republican, is elected by 1,500 plurality. The result in the Thirteenth district is close between Cockrell, Democrat, and Gilliland, Populist, with the chances favoring Cockrell. Eleven districts are Democratic.

BRYAN OUT OF POLITICS. Will Continue to Advocate the Fusion of Populists and Democrats.

Omaha, Nov. 9.—Congressman Bryan has issued a manifesto to Nebraska Democrats tonight in which he sums up the causes which led to the defeat of the fusion forces, and announces his retirement from the political arena. He says: "I shall continue as a lawyer and editor to advocate the fusion of Populists and Democrats. It is the only hope against combined monopoly."

DEMOCRATIC TEXAS.

Galveston, Nov. 9.—From returns received here it is safe to state that the state Democratic ticket is safely elected by 40,000 plurality. Culbertson, candidate for governor, is running about ten per cent behind his ticket because of his free silver views. The congressional delegation will not be solidly Democratic.

FIGURES STILL GOING UP.

Washington, Nov. 9.—Chairman Babcock, of the Republican congressional committee, has received a telegram today from Chairman Dixie, of Minnesota, saying the Republicans will send a solid delegation to congress. This increases the figures of the Republicans in the next house to 254.

IN OHIO.

East Liverpool, Ohio, Nov. 9.—The official count of the Eighteenth district complete give Taylor, Republican, 20,835; Raff, Democrat, 10,008; Coxe, Populist, 8,918. Coxe's vote exceeds the estimates of the Republican and Democratic committees 5,000.

MAJORS SURELY BEATEN.

Omaha, Nov. 9.—Complete returns for governor from all but five counties of the state show a plurality for Holcomb (fusion) over Majors, Republican, of 2,600. The five counties to hear from will increase Holcomb's plurality about 200.

TENNESSEE VERY CLOSE.

Nashville, Nov. 9.—The vote for governor is very close between Turner, Democrat, and Evans, Republican. The official returns will be necessary to determine the result. The indications point to Evans' election.

JOINT BALLOT OF TEN.

Jefferson City, Mo., Nov. 9.—Of the 24 state senators, 13 are Democrats and 11 Republicans. The house will stand, Democrats, 62, Republicans, 75, Populists 2.

A SEVERE MEASURE.

Talequah, I. T., Nov. 9.—A bill has passed both houses of the Cherokee legislature, making it treason for a Cherokee citizen to sell real estate of the nation to a non-citizen, naming as a penalty for so doing, death by hanging.

## A UTAH SURPRISE

She Will Have Two Senators Next Congress.

THE NOTORIOUS COOK GANG.

They Enter a Kansas Town Rob Stores and Kill a Citizen--Other Late News.

Washington, Nov. 9.—A point that has been overlooked in computing the political complexion of the next senate, is the admission of Utah with two senators. The bill has already passed congress admitting Utah. As there is about a month from the time the Utah constitutional convention is held until the Fifty-fourth congress meets, there will be ample time to have all formalities complied with and Utah proclaimed a state in time for its senate and representative to participate in the organization of the next congress. This would make in all 90 senators, and as the senate now stands the politics of Utah senators would cut an important figure.

Another peculiarity which arises in the admission of both New Mexico and Arizona, which may be accomplished in time so that four more senators would participate in the organization of the next senate. The bills have already passed the house for admission of both these territories. The senate committee on territories have reported them favorably to the senate, and they are now on the calendar. The senators of both parties have been urging their passage. The admission of these new states would make a total of 94 senators, and any party to control would need the fourth for a majority. With the vice-president, the Democrats could control the senate with 47 senators.

THE COOK GANG AGAIN.

They Plunder a Town and Murder a Citizen.

Coffeyville, Kan., Nov. 9.—Two of the Cook gang plundered the town of Lenapeh, I. T., and left a bloody trail behind them today. They entered the town in the character of hold bandits without any attempt to conceal their intentions, and terrorized the citizens until they had carried out their plan of robbery. E. E. Mellon, a brave young man who attempted to stop them with his gun, when they were riding away, was shot and killed. Another man whose name cannot be learned tonight is said to have been seriously wounded. Both of the victims were with a small force of citizens who hastily armed themselves and attempted to prevent the escape of the bandits. The robbers were mounted on fast horses and were heavily armed. The robbers held up the proprietors of two stores and looted both places. They also robbed the postoffice.

THREE MASKED ROBBERS.

Lander, Wyo., Nov. 9.—Three masked men entered H. C. Enderly's store at Thermopolis, covered the proprietor with guns, and compelled him to give

the robbers and mortally wounded one, Jake Snyder. The others escaped.

CHASING THE CHINESE.

Port Arthur Will Perhaps Be the Last Scene of Battle.

Shanghai, Nov. 9.—The Chinese army of the north has retired to the mountains where the soldiers are reported starving and suffering severely from cold and exposure. The Japanese army is reported encamped at Leng Wang Cheng. The Japanese are pursuing the 15,000 Chinese, mostly new recruits. Port Arthur is not expected to make a determined stand against the Japanese. Admiral Sir E. R. Fremantle, in command of the British fleet, considers that Port Arthur will probably be the scene of the last engagement of any importance between the Chinese and Japanese.

A FATAL SHOCK.

A Painter Grasped a Live Wire and Is Killed.

San Francisco, Nov. 9.—Gus. Wales, a painter working on a building, grasped an electric light wire that was in his way, and attempted to pull it aside. It was a live wire, and Wales received a shock that threw him to the sidewalk three stories below. He died soon afterward. Both legs were broken and his skull fractured.

A RECEIVER APPOINTED.

Tacoma, Nov. 9.—Otis Sprague has been appointed receiver for the Garretson, Woodruff, Pratt Company, wholesale drygoods firm, and the largest of the kind in the state. In the papers filed Leroy Pratt and Celia Woodruff, two of the largest stockholders, appear as plaintiffs, the complaint alleging that the company owes over \$400,000 which it is unable to liquidate in the ordinary course of business. The receivership is the result of a foreclosure suit begun last week by the Providence Trust Company, a large creditor. The company was organized five years ago and before the depression began, was doing a good business.

RECEIVER ASKED FOR.

Chicago, Nov. 9.—A bill for receiver for the International Nickel Mining Co. was filed in the circuit court today by the Colorado Iron Works on behalf of all the creditors. The complainant is a judgment creditor holding a claim of \$4,629 and \$3,211. The capital stock claimed the property owned by it of the defendant is \$5,000,000, but it is never exceeded in value \$100,000 since the scheme was floated by Gillette and Taylor of this city, who purchased the claim covering 200 acres in Douglas county, Oregon, from Selah Reeve, for \$5100.

ARMY PROMOTIONS.

Washington, Nov. 9.—Brigadier General Alexander McDowell McCook has been appointed major general of the United States army, vice General Howard, retired; James W. Forsyth, Seventh Cavalry, has been promoted brigadier general to succeed McCook.

A PRESIDENTIAL APPOINTMENT.

Washington, Nov. 9.—W. B. Russell, of Massachusetts, was today appointed by the president a member of the board of Indian commissioners.
